Italian Delegate is Opposed to Interterence in Far East Situation

Conference is to Establish Direct Contract Between China and Japan

ng's meeting of the Nine-Power con ference Count Luigi Aldrovandi-Marescatti, the Italian delegate, startled the conference by declaring that "the only useful thing we can contemplate is to invite the two parties to establish direct contact between them-

"After that we have nothing to do," he told the conference. The proceedings could end only in platitudinous esolutions.

Mr. Eden countered the Italian's pessimistic statement with a declaration that "if we are afraid to face possible failure we should certainly not be deserving of success.'

"This assurance I can give to the conference at the first session," the foreign secretary added. "The British government are prepared to offer the fullest collaboration to promote the success of the work of the conference. For our part, we believe the very difficulty of our enterprise should stimulate our energies. We hope that with the least possible delay the conference will resolve itself into a working committee and so get to grips with its task.
