The Grand Old Man of the Civil Service, George M. Byron, King's Printer, celebrated his seventy-second birthday yesterday and the event was kindly remembered by many of the officials of the department of the Provincial Treasury and others. At the close of the day the blinds were drawn in the Treasurer's office and Mr. Byron was invited to come into the Treasury room. When he arrived there he found a large table nicely decorated and in the centre a three tier birthday cake with numerous candles brightly burning. W. Borden Trites, Deputy Secretary Treasurer, stepped forward and on behalf of the assembled officials presented the popular King's Printer with a large box of cigars. Another box contained a suitable gift of imported silverware specially designed for the occasion. In making the presentation Mr. Trites referred to the affection in which Mr. Byron was held by every member of the Civil Service Staff and particularly by those with whom he was intimately associated in the Treasury Department. He extended to Mr. Byron his best wishes for many years of happy life. The gathering sang For He's a Jolly Good Fellow.

Mr. Byron or "Judge" Byron as his friends love to call him is one of the leading members of the Elks in this city. no disclosure as to the matters to be discussed was made by government officials. It is understood, however, that a delegation of New Brunswick potato growers will appear before the body to ask their cooperation in getting assistance from the Dominion government in having a new, large frost proof potato shed erected at West Saint John. The only members of the cabinet in the city at press time were the Premier, Hon. Mr. McNair and Hon. Dr. A. P. Paterson, Minister of Education, Federal and Municipal Relations. It is expected, however, that several others will arrive in the city late this afternoon or tonight for the meeting.

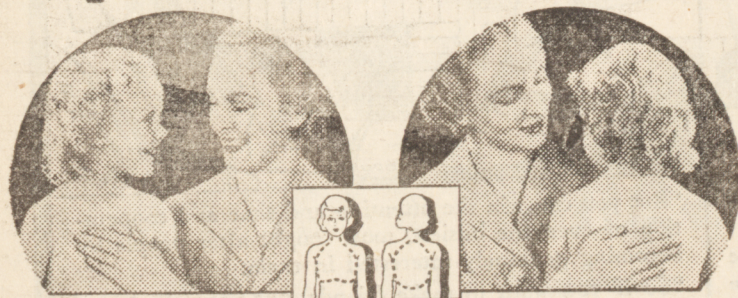

King Boris of Bulgaria, railway enthusiast, who left London recently with Queen Joanna, drove the London, Midland and Scottish "Coronation Scot" express train on a special run from London to Bletchley, Buckinghamshire. This is the train that holds the British rail speed record of 114 m. p. h. The engine driver said he was amazed at the professional manner in which the King handled the controls.
