QUINTS TO BE GUESTS OF CBC

CALLANDER, May 26—The squeals and laughter of the world's most famous babies, the Dionne Quintuplets—Yvonne, Marie, Annette, Cecile and Emilie—and the voices of Dr. Allan Roy Dafeo, their physician, Judge J. A. Vallin, of the board of guardians, and the nurses will be broadcast throughout the North American continent when the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation presents from Callander, Ontario, from 5.30 to 6.00 p.m., EST, the celebrations of the quintuplets' third birthday party on May 28.

The broadcast, which will be carried over the eastern network of the CBC and over the networks of the National Broadcasting Company, the Columbia Broadcasting System and the Mutual Broadcasting System in the United States, will originate in the Dafeo Hospital and will be heard by a potential listening audience of more than 20 million people.

CBC officials, now at Callander making preparations for the broadcast, report that the children, who now can talk, recite nursery rhymes and sing simple songs, have developed into real radio talent and are expected to provide the most interesting broadcast ever presented from this Northern Ontario nursery. As in previous broadcasts, officials of the CBC will work behind glass partitions to insure complete safety for the babies and portable microphones will be installed inside the nursery to pick up their sounds and voices. The announcers will exchange conversation with Dr. Dafeo and the babies by means of a two-way communication and this will make possible informal interviews to be heard during the broadcast.

NEW YORK, May 26—Fred Allen's NBC broadcast is the favorite Radio City hangout of caricaturists. The sketch artists find great delight in putting on paper the expressive visage of the Town Hall funster.

There are two reasons why Fred attracts the artists. First, he is a master "mugger" who can conjure up some of the most amazing expressions that ever frightened an unsuspecting microphone. Second, Fred is a satirist at heart and therefore strikes a sympathetic response with the artistic satirists.

The caricaturists are great favorites with Fred also. He prefers their work to photographs because he sees in their pictures of him, the characterizations or the impressions that he endeavors to create in his microphone comedy. In fact, the Lanky Yankee believes that the true picture of himself as a radio personality would be that drawn by a caricaturist listening in who never has seen him.

Caricaturists and others may do their listening each Wednesday over the NBC-Red network at 9:00 p.m., EDT.
