

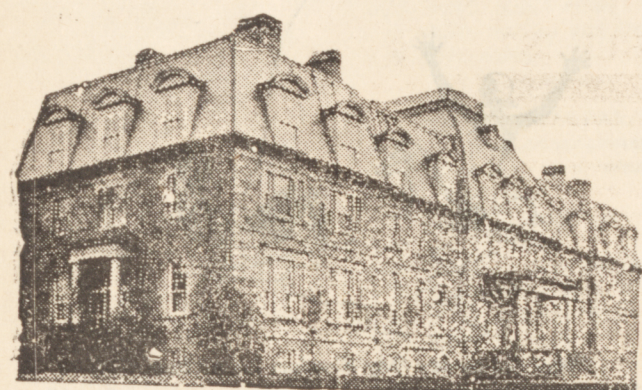

Chief Forester on the fire situation. A crew equipped with fire fighting material was immediately despatched to the scene of the most serious fire.

While the province was suffering from the worst drought of the season, it is gratifying to officials of the Department of Lands and Mines to note that in twelve million acres of publicly and privately owned forest lands only seven fires have been reported, and only one had assumed serious proportions. Rain was badly needed to improve conditions, but every care to prevent further outbreaks must be exercised by those who have occasion to visit forest land.

Dr. H. S. Everett, coroner, announced no inquest would be necessary.

The victim had been in St. Stephen earlier in the day and had just secured a license for the car. He returned here on the evening train and set out for St. Stephen with the other three later.

The mishap occurred about 9.30 o'clock and he died before 1 a. m. Sunday morning. It is said the driver was unaware he was so close to the highway intersection and could not bring it to a stop in time to make the turn.

Mr. Short is survived by a wife and two small children, aged six and three years. He is a son of Mr. and Mrs. Harry Short, McAdam. This is the first break in a large family of 10 children, as besides his parents, there are four brothers and five sisters to mourn. They are William, Frank, Harry, and Carl and Mrs. B. N. stances and withholding from market feeder and stocker grades not yet fit.

O. Freer of Winnipeg, Managing Director of United Stockmen Limited, will be in charge of administration of the scheme. Headquarters have not yet been decided upon, but will probably be at some town close to the assembly area in Manitoba, which is a short distance south of Carberry, Man. Carberry is ninety-five miles west of Winnipeg.

In addition to the initial price received by the producer he will get an additional sum when the final sale has been made if a greater amount is realized.

Sell Carload Lots

The plan has not yet been worked out in full detail but consideration has been given to a proposal that carload lots of cattle be sold at auction in the Manitoba assembly area. Saskatchewan and Alberta Government officials could give no estimate of the number of surplus cattle in their respective Provinces. A survey will be made as soon as possible however to determine the number that will have to be moved. It has been unofficially estimated that Saskatchewan now has about



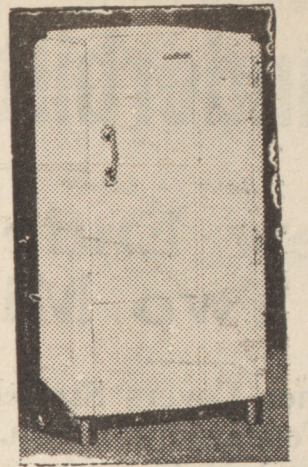

20 per cent. more cattle than in 1931.
