

# "SPEAKIES" ARE CLOSED BY POLICE

## BOOTLEGGERS NABBED BY "MOP-UP" SQUAD AS R.C.M.P. COMMENCE CAMPAIGN AGAINST VIOLATORS N. B. LIQUOR ACT

Week-end Raids Net Mounties One Thousand Quarts Commission Stock---Three Offenders Fined in Police Court This Morning

### PRISONER TAKEN TO HOSPITAL

R. C. M. P. Corporal Ryder Engineered Opening Drive Saturday Night---Greatest Liquor Raid in History of the Capital City

THREE court convictions, with sentences of two months each and \$200 or an additional two months, was the sequel to the biggest "mop-up" in the history of the city, when R.C.M.P. officers, under the direction of Corporal Ryder, head of the Fredericton detachment, seized well over 1,000 quarts of liquor Saturday night. Five car-loads of liquor were transported to the detachment lockers after the raid Saturday night, and operations continued until Sunday night when additional searches were made. Evidence was found in three establishments, but not in sufficient quantities to warrant a prosecution.

## FORCES MUST BE CONTROLLED TO SAVE THE WORLD

J. King Gordon Heard in Address at St. Paul's

"These are days in which the hand of God is cutting into history and laying hold upon the people compelling them to make momentous decisions," declared Rev. J. King Gordon, Montreal, noted lecturer and writer, in an address delivered at last evening's service in St. Paul's United Church. "Today's Faith is Tomorrow's World" was the subject of the speaker's discourse in which he referred to the great problem, social and spiritual, which are facing the world today.

Rev. Mr. Gordon described the world as "dynamic not static." It is constantly changing and these changes are moved by giant forces which must be controlled if society is to be saved from destruction, he said. Many people cling to the insistence that the change must be peaceful and gradual but the forces in the world are so tremendous that it would require the utmost in human intelligence if a transition to a new social order is to be achieved in a peaceful way, the speaker continued.

The critical stage has been reached, Rev. Mr. Gordon asserted, expressing the view that the world must step ahead into a new social order or else society will perish in the same way as European society is now perishing. Preparedness for this step is essential, he added, pointing out that from the christian point of view this "preparedness" involves the reversal of old attitudes.

He classified the principles of "christian preparedness" under three headings discussing each in turn. A new conception of morality a new conception of community and a new belief in God, were described as necessary to bring about the transition to a new social order. Dealing with the "new belief in God," Rev. Mr. Gordon stated that He should be viewed not only as ideal of worship but as a positive force in human history—a force for the moral and social uplifting of the people.

Rev. Mr. Gordon left this afternoon for Newcastle where he will speak this evening. He will then proceed to Dalhousie and later return to Montreal.

## FATE OF DAYLIGHT SAVING TIME IN BALANCE AS OPPONENTS CARRY FIGHT TO THE SEAT OF CIVIC GOVERNMENT

Request City Council to Hold Plebiscite On Question

The controversy concerning the proposed adoption of daylight time in Fredericton will likely be settled at the meeting being held in the city hall this afternoon. Opponents of the new time have carried the fight into the council chamber of the city hall and are requesting that the civic government rescind its motion authorizing the adoption of daylight time on June 26.

The opposition forces have secured more than 1,300 names on the circular last week. It is understood that C. L. Dougherty is presenting the petition at this afternoon's meeting. He is being supported by a strong delegation, all of whom are strongly opposed to the proposed plan.

In the event that the city cannot legally rescind the original motion at this date, the delegates are asking that a plebiscite be held to determine the wishes of the citizens in regard to the matter.

The council passed the motion providing for the adoption of daylight on the request of many citizens who contended that Fredericton should reject standard time during the summer months. They argued that the fact that other centres in the province have adopted the new time and that there should be a uniformity of time, particularly, because of business reasons.

The matter has been the subject of much comment during the past several days. Supporters of the proposed scheme have not made any definite moves and it is not known whether they will endeavor to block the efforts of the opponents.

### GOV'T MEETING

Several matters of importance are included on the agenda of the next meeting of the provincial cabinet which takes place Wednesday afternoon. All the ministers, including Hon. Dr. W. F. Roberts, minister of health, who has been ill for several weeks, are expected to be present. Hon. A. A. Dysart, K.C., premier and minister of public works, left during the week-end for his home in Buctouche. He will return here tomorrow.

Although no official information is available, it is understood that the next meeting will be one of the most important held by the cabinet since the prorogation of the Legislature this spring. Premier Dysart will preside at the meeting. During his absence Hon. J. B. McNair, K.C., attorney-general, was acting-premier.

## ENTRANCE EXAMS COMMENCE AT P.N.S. HERE TODAY

One Hundred Fifty-one Pupils Are Writing the Papers

High School entrance examinations commenced here in the Provincial Normal School this morning. One hundred fifty-one pupils, representing schools in Fredericton and other places throughout the district, are writing the papers. The geography examination was held this morning, while in the afternoon the pupils wrote the exams on English-Composition. The supervisors in charge of the examinations here include Mrs. Creed, Miss Mahwinney, David MacFarlane and Charles Tweeddale.

According to an official report released this morning from the office of the minister of education, there are 2,500 candidates writing the exams this year. These figures do not include all the students who will be admitted to High School, as many students will be admitted this year on recommendation.

In 1936, the number of candidates who wrote the High School Entrance Examination papers was 2,376, and the number of candidates who were admitted on recommendation was 1,808.
