

# New York Teams Score Victories In Major League Engagements

## 17-Hit Batting Rally Gives Yanks Decisive Win Over the Tigers

### Hubbell Triumphs Over Dean—White Sox Win Series

NEW YORK, June 27—Led off by "Twinkletons" Selkirk, the Canadian with the big bat, the Yankees took Detroit pitching apart today and walloped the Tigers 9-5 with a 17-hit attack.

Selkirk socked his 16th homer, a triple and two singles, driving in four runs to set the pace that dropped the Tigers a notch, strengthened the Yankees' hold on first place and gave murderers' row a record of nine wins and three setbacks in their just-ended home stay.

Selkirk, by driving in four runs, was the Yankees' big gun, but Red Rolfe and Tony Lazzeri kept pace with him by also collecting four hits apiece.

The Athletics divided a doubleheader with Cleveland Indians in Philadelphia holding them scoreless in the first game, 10-0, to administer their second successive shutout. The Indians scored their first run of the series in the first inning of the second game and went on to beat the Macks, 7-2.

**Red Sox Take Two**  
Behind the six-hit pitching of Jack Wilson the Red Sox shut out the Browns 8-0 in the opener and then hammered three St. Louis pitchers for 16 hits to capture the nightcap 11-7.

Behind the steady pitching of the veteran Ted Lyons, Chicago White Sox swept a three-game series from the Senators with a 5-3 victory which moved them into second place in the American League standing.

Detroit defeated the Yankees 5-3 Saturday and the White Sox nosed out Washington 6-5.

At Boston Jim Walkup held the hard-hitting Red Sox to four hits while St. Louis Browns pounded out a 7-1 decision. Cleveland Indians, seemingly helpless on the road, were blanked 7-0 at Philadelphia by the last-place Athletics.

**Hubbell Triumphs**  
NEW YORK, June 27—Crafty Carl Hubbell, triumphed over his arch-rival, "Dizzy" Dean, today in pitching New York Giants to an 8-1 victory over the Cardinals in St. Louis.

A crowd of 33,719 was attracted by the magnet of the Hubbell-Dean duel, making a total of more than 120,000 who have witnessed the two pitchers in their three encounters so far this year. Hubbels has won two of them.

The New York left-hander let a shutout go by the boards when he permitted Don Padgett to go to second unmolested after the Cardinal rightfielder had singled in the ninth inning.

**Dodgers Down Cubs**  
Behind the excellent pitching of Van Lingle Mungo and Luke Hamlin, the Dodgers beat the league-leading Cubs twice, 8-3 and 6-3, before 26,393 Chicago fans.

Mungo won his ninth victory of the season when he struck out six Cubs and kept 10 hits scattered in the first game. The Dodgers knocked Larry French out and continued a 10-hit attack against Leroy Parmelee and Curt Davis.

After getting off to a bad start, Red Lucas settled down and with the aid of home runs by Arky Vaughan and Al Todd, the Pirates took the final game of the three-game Pittsburgh series from Philadelphia, 4-3.

Lucas was touched for five hits in the first two innings when the Phils took the lead, 2-0. Vaughan got one run back in the Pirate second with his homer and Al Todd put them ahead in the fourth, lining out a homer with one on.

**Bees Win Doubleheader**  
Pounding out a total of 28 hits, Boston Bees swept both games of a doubleheader with the Reds, 8-2 and 10-5, before a Cincinnati crowd of 20,262.

Saturday, the Dodgers defeated the Cubs, 2-1 in 11 innings while the Giants handed the second-place St. Louis Cardinals a 5-3 defeat.

Cincinnati's amazing Reds scored their seventh victory in nine starts, a 2-0 shutout of Boston Bees. At Pittsburgh, the Phillies nosed out the Pirates, 7-6.

**Not to be Head Team**  
LONDON, June 27—Hon. Charles J. Lyttleton, noted Worcestershire cricketer, will be unable to captain the English cricket team to tour Canada in August. He was threatened with pneumonia following a recent attack of influenza and has not recovered sufficiently to undertake the trip, it is announced.

## Stars Paired In All-England Tennis Meet At Wimbledon Eng.

WIMBLEDON, June 27—Stars from all over the world rested today for the second and hardest week of the two weeks' all-England tournament, Wimbledon's fortnight of tennis.

Eight players remained in the men's singles and they came close to being the best eight amateurs in the world. The women's singles, down to the last 16, followed the same trend.

The eight men who will play their quarter-final matches tomorrow are H. W. (Bunny) Austin, England's No. 1; Baron Gottfried Von Cramm and Heinrich Henkel, Germany's Davis Cup team; Jack Crawford and Vivian McGrath of Australia and three United States players, Don Budge,

the favorite for the title, Bryan Grant and Frank Parker.

Of these only Parker was not listed by A. Wallis Myers, the noted British critic, in his world's first 10. Members of Myers list missing were Fred Perry, now a professional; Wilmer Allison, United States, retired, and Adrian Quist, Australian player who is ill.

Tomorrow's pairings send Austin against Grant; Budge versus McGrath; Parker vs. Henkel and Von Cramm vs. Crawford. The quarter-finals were completed Saturday with four matches.

### Austin Crushes Lacroix

Before 25,000 spectators Austin scored a crushing victory over Andre

Lacroix of Belgium 6-2, 6-1, 6-0, and Crawford went ahead almost as easily, disposing of L. Shann of Great Britain, 6-4, 6-3, 6-6.

Most of the day's fireworks were crowded into a clash between the rising young British southpaw, Charles Hare, and Henkel. Prospective opponents in the Davis Cup final, should Germany get by the United States, the young players fought a dour struggle with Henkel finally winning out, 6-4, 3-6, 3-6, 6-2, 6-3.

British tennis fans felt somewhat heartened about their Davis Cup chances as they watched Hare storm the net in a ferocious attack to win two of the three first sets. Had he sustained a similar offensive for another set he might have pulled through.

In the fourth match Von Cramm soundly defeated Gene Mako, United States player better known for his doubles ability, 6-0, 6-2, 6-3.

Headed by Helen Jacobs and Hilda Krahwinkel Sterling, respectively winner and runner-up last year, the women's survivors included the first eight of the "world's first 10" of their sex.

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
