## BRIEF INTERVIEWS

Johnny the Call Boy: "The parade of people before the microphone in our two 'Johnny Presents' programs never ceases to fascinate me. These are men and women in every walk of life whom exciting adventures have befallen. And yet, in their quiet appearance and demeanor, there is nothing to indicate that they have ever experienced anything out of the ordinary. The most interesting thing of all is the way heroes who have risked their lives without a trace of fear turn pale and tremble when they face the microphone!" Betty Wragge (Ingenue of "Pepper Young's Family"): "It seems strange, today, when one considers the exploitation of 'names' in radio. In the early days the identity of performers was jealously guarded. Announcers never received any credit when I first came into radio in 1927. They were known by letters and not by names. Station bands remained shrouded in anonymity."

Carl Ravell: "Colleges are becoming increasingly important as training schools for radio musicians. The students, playing in campus bands, gain valuable experience, not only in music but also in the art of pleasing their audiences. At least 80 per cent. of the outstanding bandleaders today are college graduates and got their start on the campus."

Tim and Irene: "Radio puts more of a strain on the ingenuity and ability of comedians than vaudeville or musical comedy ever did. For a half hour program, a comic must have an average of three gags a minute. He's on the air approximately 18 minutes, and that means 54 gags a week—each one of which has to be new and fresh. If 45 of these jokes register satisfactorily, that is a good average."

NEW YORK, June 28—Rapt concentration on hundreds of faces—breaths drawn lightly, silently, in fear of breaking the spell that grips them all. . . . That's the studio audience every Wednesday night when the gifted Helen Menken assumes her role of Brenda Williams in the serial drama Second Husband, heard over the NBC-Blue network, from 8:30 to 9 p.m., EDT.

In translating her art from the stage to the microphone Miss Menken has retained her great ability to breathe life and fire into drama. Onlookers in the studio, it seems, feel as though the magic that she conjures up before them would be immediately withdrawn if the slightest sound betrayed their presence.

## NBC BUILDS TENT STUDIO TO COVER THE JAMBOREE

WASHINGTON, June 28—If your son is one of 30,000 Boy Scouts at the National Scout Jamboree in Washington, D. C., you'll be able to follow his activities as closely as if you were there through the series of broadcasts arranged by the National Broadcasting Company from June 30 to July 9.

NBC's coverage of the extent, the most elaborate and extensive of a national event since President Roosevelt's inaugural in January, will get under way on Wednesday, June 30, when flag raising ceremonies inaugurating the ten-day session will be broadcast at 10:45 a.m., EDT, over the NBC-Blue network.

NBC engineers will erect within the shadow of the Washington Monument, a studio in a 40-foot circular tent at General Jamboree Headquarters. Some 50 to 100 radio engineers, production men and announcers will work from this completely equipped studio. The studio in "Jamboree City" will be linked with the master control room of NBC's Washington studios and, through that, to the New York master control in Radio City. The programs which will thus be "fed" to the NBC networks, also will be short-waved to foreign countries.

Commentators on Scene  
During the Jamboree, the Scouts' studio will be visited by famed NBC commentators who plan to broadcast their regular programs from the camp. Radio experts and technicians will be on hand to explain the "hows" and "whys" of broadcasting to the thousands of Scouts interested. Supplementing the approximately 30,000 Scouts from all sections of the United States will be more than 400 others, representing 24 European foreign nations.

In addition to the tent studio, NBC will use a mobile unit, pack set, units, and other equipment which will permit announcers to roam through the camp describing the activities of the Scouts.

Part of the Magic Key of RCA program on Sunday, July 4, at 2:00 p.m., EDT, over the NBC-Blue network, will be dedicated to the Scouts.

## CBC NOTES

The final broadcast in the "Historic Roads of Ontario" series will be given to the listeners of the CBC midwest network on Monday, June 28, at 6:30 p.m., EST. The speaker will be Dr. H. Tolman, of the Ontario Archives, who will discuss earlier times along the old highways of the province, under the title: "Coaches and Inns." The series has been devoted to stories of historical interest and comments on the modernization of several of the oldest thoroughfares in Ontario.

The tenth concert in the music appreciation feature, "Concert Series," will be heard over the CBC eastern and central network from Toronto on Tuesday, June 29, at 7 p.m., EST. Ernest Dainty will be guest conductor of the concert orchestra and Albert Kennedy, the well known Canadian baritone, will be assisting artist.

Ernest Dainty, who is familiar to radio audiences as pianist, organist and composer, as well as conductor, will direct his orchestra in the performance of a movement from Franz Schubert's "Unfinished Symphony in B Minor," one of the best known and greatest works written by this master.

Albert Kennedy will sing Handel's air, "Honour and Arms," and a lesser known solo by the same composer, "Silent Worship." Dr. F. J. Horwood will again be the commentator on this tenth in a series of programs so arranged as to include many of the important works by composers from the time of Bach and Corelli to the present day.

John B. Kennedy, noted NBC commentator, will visit the Jamboree Headquarters and broadcast from the tent studio.

Other programs planned by NBC include a broadcast of the National Jamboree Camp Fire on Wednesday, June 30, featuring addresses by such eminent Scouts as Dan Beard, Admiral Cary T. Grayson, Robert Baden-Powell and Dr. James West. This program will be heard on the NBC-Blue network from 9:30 to 10 p.m., EDT. On Sunday, July 4, at 8:30 p.m., EDT, over the same network, NBC will broadcast one of the high spots of the gathering—the non-sectarian inspirational convocation at the base of the Washington Monument, where the 30,000 Scouts and possibly as many adults will gather for the service.

### March Before President

When the Boy Scouts pay tribute to the unknown soldier, NBC will broadcast their pilgrimage to the tomb at Arlington in an NBC-Red network program from 11:45 a.m. to 12 noon, EDT, on Monday, July 5. A description and the actual sounds of a huge and colorful fireworks display will be heard during the Jamboree Independence Day broadcast on the same day at 9:15 p.m., EDT, over the NBC-Blue network.

President Roosevelt's review of the Jamboree Parade and his inspection tour between the lines of Scouts will be described by NBC announcers in a mobile unit and from atop the Washington Monument. The President's reception of the Scouts on the White House grounds also will be heard. This program is scheduled for NBC-Red network listeners, from 11:30 to 11:45 a.m., EDT, on Thursday, July 8.

A farewell broadcast on Thursday, July 8, the closing night of the Jamboree, will be an NBC-Blue network feature, from 8 to 8:30 p.m., EDT. During this program, Dr. West, Chief Scout, will make a brief address and Scouts from far and near will be interviewed as they prepare to pull up stakes and set out for home.

Sophisticated dance tempos will be featured by Percy Pasternak's orchestra in a half hour program of interesting rhythms on the CBC presentation, "Rhythm Varieties," which will be heard from Toronto on Monday, June 28, at 6 p.m., EST over the eastern network. The program is selected from the hit tunes of current motion picture musicals and is specially arranged by the director.

## STUDIO NOTES

Harold Sumberg, violinist, will be guest artist with Alexander Chuhaldin's "Melodic Strings." CBC-NBC international exchange program, originating in the Toronto studios, on Monday, June 28, at 8:30 p.m., EST. Mr. Sumberg, who is concert master of the Promenade Symphony Orchestra of Toronto, under the conductorship of Reginald Stewart, is among the leading violinists of Canada. He will play the second movement from the violin concerto by Tchaikovsky, arranged by Chuhaldin. "Melodic Strings," which has been a feature of the Canadian airwaves for the past four years, is considered one of the outstanding string organizations in radio. For this date the orchestra will present "Passacaglio and Fugue," by Bach, and the brilliant Goetz "Serenade in D Major, Op. 22, No. 1."

## "Sterilized" Gold Holdings Pass Billion Mark

WASHINGTON, June 26—The United States Treasury reported today its holdings sterilized gold reached \$1,009,343,288 on June 18.

(Sterilized gold is that paid for with funds borrowed in the money market and placed in an inactive Treasury account.)

(The sterilization program was inaugurated last in December to prevent gold inflows from increasing the supply of domestic credit and possibly laying the basis for inflation.)
