

Cubs 2-0 Win Victory Over Reds Fans Flickering Pennant Hopes

Giants Now Lead By Four Games

Terrymen Rained Out; Pirates 6-2 Over Cards; Yanks and Senators Split; Tigers Win Over Browns; Indians Nose Chisox

NEW YORK, Sept. 28—Clay Bryant, towering right hander, today pitched and batted Chicago Cubs to a 2-0 victory over the Reds and this kept alive the flickering flame which is Chicagoans' pennant hope. With the Giants rained out of their double date with Boston, the Cubs out the league leaders' advantage to four games, but hardly made things simpler for themselves.

The Giants' doubleheader was washed out of the schedule. As a result the pacesetters need only to win two of their remaining seven games to sew up the pennant, no matter what Chicago does in its five.

Loose play by the Cardinals allowed Pittsburgh to rally four runs in the fifth frame and move into third place with a 6-2 victory.

Rookie Trims Yanks
Joe Kraskauskas, sensational south-paw rookie, who started his baseball career at Hamilton, Ont., silenced Yankees' big hitters today as he marked up his fourth win in five major league starts for the Senators. He held Yanks to seven hits as Washington scored a 2-1 victory in the nightcap of a doubleheader after dropping the opener 9-0. The Ontario boy whiffed nine Yankee batters.

St. Louis' discouraged Browns bowed before Detroit's Tigers 6-1.

Detroit took an early lead and never was in danger. The Browns' only run, in the fourth, resulted from two errors by Bill Rogell, Tiger shortstop.


With the Sox leading 10-5, the second game was called on account of darkness after the first half of the fourth inning. It was not a legal game.


Earle "Squirely" Gorman is being sought by the Aberdeen Street nine as a referee for the game in Moncton.



THEY MAY RUIN TERRY'S HOPES

The fiercest flag fight of a decade in the National League—famous for its close, deadly pennant races—crashes to a furious, closing crescendo this week.

And, as is often the case, it may be that the club which wins, loses. For be it New York Giants or Chicago Cubs, the ultimate survivor of the bitter campaign will be battle weary and exhausted, when it meets the Yankees, who will have had nearly two weeks' rest between clinching their second straight American League title on September 23 and the opening of the World Series on October 6.

Entering the stretch the Giants, defending champions, possess a lead of four and a half games over their closest and only challengers, the Cubs.

Under ordinary conditions three additional games to play would mean three additional chances to insure their lead. But because of the constant pressure they have had to exert to prevent their being overtaken by the Cubs, and because of the severity of the closing week's schedule, these three games now loom as the most formidable threat to the Giants' successful defense of the title they won a year ago.

The Giants face a stretch of eight games in four days; a total of twelve games in seven days; and a string of five twinbills, while the Cubs have only seven single games to be played in seven days.

The Giants must play doubleheaders with the Bees, one yesterday, one today in the Polo Grounds; with the Phillies in the Baker handbox tomorrow and Friday; and then wind up with a four game series in Brooklyn over the weekend.

At the same time the Cubs play a routine schedule of four single games. So the National League season comes to a typical cutthroat conclusion this week; with the Giants fighting gamely to protect a three and a half game lead, which looms none too large in the face of their exhausting schedule; and the Cubs making a final bid against time.

Johnson Released By N. Y. Rangers

Ching Leaves of His Own Will; Turns Down Offer of Coaching Job With New York Rovers; Murray Murdoch Is Also Through

NEW YORK, Sept. 28—Ivan (Ching) Johnson, war-scarred in France and equally battered at home in hockey, tonight stuck grimly to the veteran campaigner's song, "an old soldier never dies."

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
