On January 28, 1928. she was the National Broadcasting Company's choice for its experimental television broadcast.

In the New York World-Telegram's first radio popularity poll, conducted in 1932, Jessica won first honors which had earlier been awarded her in a similar survey conducted by the Literary Digest.
