Aldermen and Junk

BUCKINGHAM PALACE

MOST people who know the circumstances will resent the uncalled for attack made upon the city aldermen in regard to the action at the City Council in remitting the fines which were recently imposed upon the seven gentlemen who resigned from the City Council as a protest against the action of the Municipalities Committee of the Legislature in turning down the Police Commission bill. The aldermen who resigned did so on a question of principle and they were endorsed by the citizens by being returned without opposition. When they resigned they deposited each twenty-five dollars as called for in such cases. At the last Council meeting the motion to return to these gentlemen the \$25 was moved by Alderman Olts, and seconded by Alderman Mc-Caughey. These two gentlemen were entirely opposed to the action of the seven gentlemen who retired, and were not in sympathy with their stand on the police question. As a matter of courtesy, however, Alderman Olts and Alderman McCaughey showed themselves good sports and moved that the fines be returned to their seven opponents. The aldermen who paid the fines and who were later returned to the council took no action whatever in the movement to have these fines remitted and any statement crediting them with such a procedure is entirely unfair.

As a matter of precedent it might be well to point out that it is not so very long ago since an alderman in an uptown ward retired to become a candidate for Mayor. That alderman retired before his term had expired and we have not heard so far that he ever paid \$25 into the city as required by bye-law. All this is small stuff. Any alderman of the City Council that gives his time to the work is entitled to a good deal more than \$25.

In regard to blaming the aldermen, if any one could call it blame, for proposing that the cannon be removed from the front of the Custom House, this was not the proposition of the City Aldermen. It was the proposition of the Local Improvement Association and of several members of the Board of Trade, and was conveyed by the President of the Local Improvement Association. Mayor G. Willard Kitchen, who requested the Council to take action in regard to the matter.

We believe that the general concensus opinion will be that the members of the Local Improvement Association, and of the City Council have as much spirit of patriotism in their veins as have any of those persons who make criticism about the German guns in front of the Post Office or at any other building. 
