## Hitler Warns

(Continued from Page One)

Der Fuehrer made several indirect references in caustic terms to the Pope's Palm Sunday encyclical, in which the Pontiff condemned Nazi ideologies as articles of faith, charged the German authorities with "more or less open" violation of the 1933 Concordat, and gave assurances that "if a struggle should come the Church would stand up for its rights and liberties."

A significant passage in Hitler's speech today was:

"I will not permit the authority of the German people to be attacked in any way or from any quarter. This refers to the churches, too. As long as they concern themselves with their religious problems alone the state does not concern itself with them. But if they, through any measures, such, for example, as (pastoral) letters, encyclicals and so forth, attempt to usurp rights which belong to the state then we shall reduce them to their recognized spiritual activities of caring for souls."

## Trials Back Threat

Indirect attacks by the Nazis on the Roman Catholic Church, in the form of the new wave of immorality and currency-smuggling trials involving Catholic lay brothers and clerics, is known to be Hitler's way of replying in a concrete manner to the Palm Sunday encyclical. Thus, in a way, he already is carrying out the threat which he made today.

Der Fuehrer also condemned by implication those passages in the encyclical in which the Pope indirectly cast reflections on the moral level of the Nazi regime.

"It will not do," he continued, "to criticize the morals of a state if one has more than sufficient reason to look after the morals of one's own affairs."

Hitler referred thus to the cases of immorality among priests, and in monasteries which the Nazi authorities have uncovered and to the Nazi assertion that the church is attempting to hide such facts.

He preceded his reference to the churches with a warning to all Germans that they had better learn to obey, since the only alternatives were to "bend or be broken." He explained that "the great organizations of our powerful movement" were intended to "educate the people in obedience," adding:

"We shall ignore the stupidity of certain individuals, but shall route our opponents."

Der Fuehrer delivered his speech before an immediate audience of more than 30,000 persons assembled in the Lustgarten and to a more distant radio audience of many millions. Not only in Berlin, but in other cities throughout the Reich, loudspeakers had been erected in main thoroughfares and squares, and workers, clerks and minor officials were mobilized to hear Hitler.

According to Dr. Paul Joseph Goebbels, Minister of Propaganda and Public Enlightenment, 1,700,000 persons, or nearly two-fifths of Berlin's population, marched up and assembled in the Lustgarten and along the so-called "triumphal way," which extends for nearly five miles from the Lustgarten through Unter den Linden to the Deutsches Opernhaus. Although this figure was said to cover only those persons who assembled in the various units of the Nazi Labor Front and other such organizations, it probably included many others who flocked to convenient points along the way to see Der Fuehrer pass.

Just the banners carried on May Day by workers in Moscow's Red Square damn the Fascist and Nazis, so Hitler in his speech today damned the Bolsheviks, declaring that "the chosen people (the Jews) formed the whole of the Soviet leadership, to the exclusion of all real Russian proletarians."

"Look how they murder and kill each other," he added, with regard to the recent Moscow treason trials.

Today's observations were primarily held as a workers' festival, but Hitler had said news for the workers. He made it perfectly clear that he and his aids had no intention of permitting rises in wages in the near future.

OTTAWA, May 6—Four new assistant inspectors have been appointed to the staff of the Civil Aviation Branch, it was announced today. The new appointees are K. F. Saunders, formerly in charge of the St. Lawrence North Shore air mail with headquarters at Rimouski, Que.; Donald Saunders, instructor of the Halifax Aero Club; F. M. Carter and G. C. Upson, formerly connected with the Saskatchewan Government air service.

## BOSS TRAMPS 40 MILES TO SAVE LIFE OF GUIDE

MONTREAL, May 6—Flown 120 miles to Montreal for an emergency operation, Armand Tremblay, 40-year-old guide and woodsman, was given a good chance for recovering tonight by attending doctors.

He owed his life to Charles Emile Prefontaine, his Montreal employer, who trapped forty miles from an isolated camp at Lac LeFerne, where the guide became ill Saturday, to the nearest telephone to summon help.

Tremblay arrived here by plane early this morning and was rushed to hospital in an ambulance waiting near the seaplane base where the machine which had left Rockcliffe Airport just two and a half hours earlier for the Northern Lake was brought down by Pilot Barnet MacLaren.

Doctors were ready for the critically ill patient when brought to the operating table. A short time after emergency operations for peritonitis and ruptured stomach had been performed, they pronounced the guide practically "out of danger."

## FOUR STUDENTS HELD FOR FIRING AT JEWS

WARSAW, May 6—Four students, members of the extremist "Polish Union of Nationalist Radical Youth," were arrested yesterday and charged with firing into the Jewish May Day parade last Saturday, killing one child. Police discovered a chemical laboratory equipped for manufacturing firecrackers in the home of one of the youths, Henry Patura.

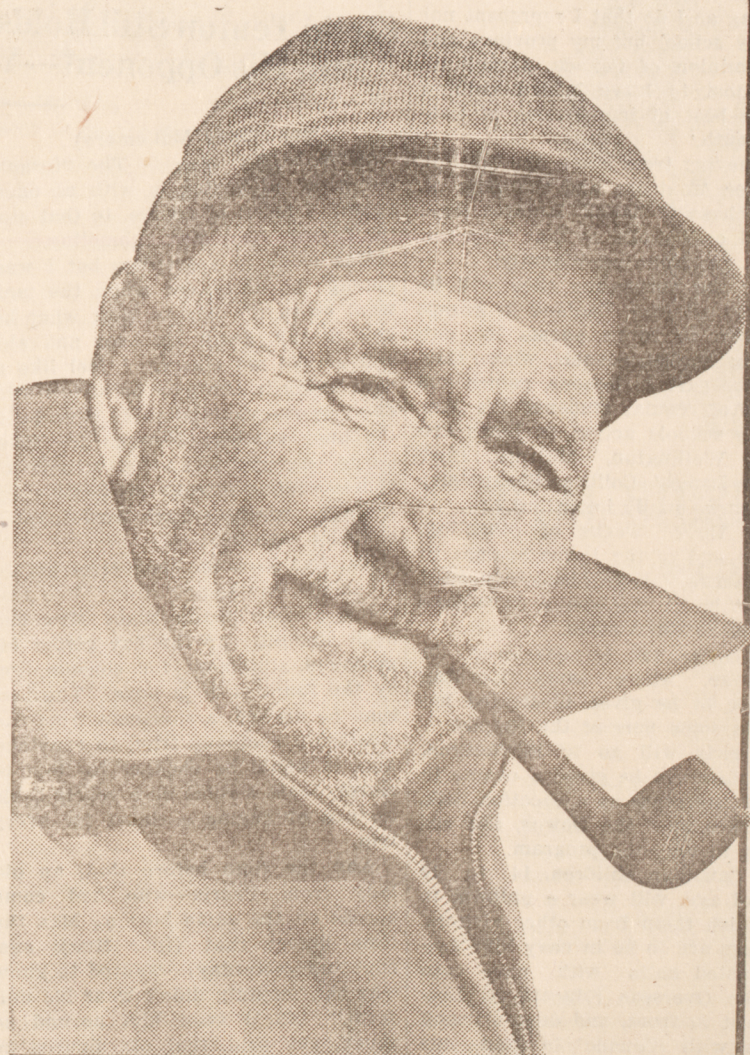

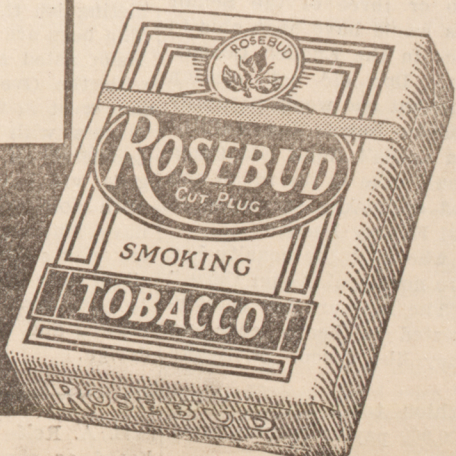
