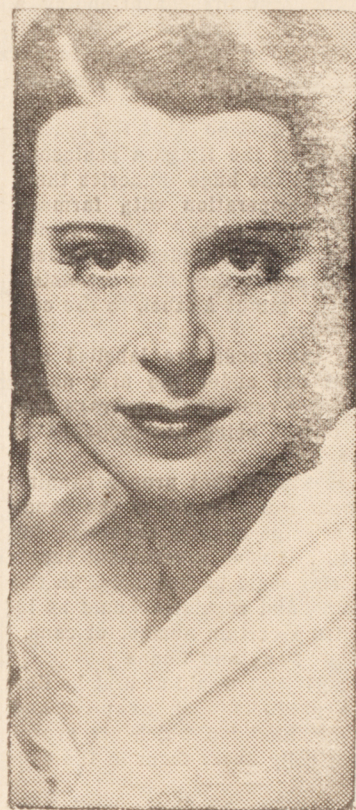

Kitty Carlisle . . . General Motors guest on May 9.

NEW YORK, May 6—John Charles Thomas, Metropolitan Opera baritone, and Kitty Carlisle, singing star of stage and screen, will share guest star honors on the General Motors Promenade Concert over the NBC-Blue network on Sunday, May 9, at 8:00 p.m., EDT.

Miss Carlisle, recently featured in the Broadway musical, "White Horse Inn," has chosen for her Promenade selections the "Jewel Song," from Gounod's "Faust," and "Carry Me Back to Old Virginny," by Bland.

Thomas will be heard in the "Toreador Song," from Bizet's "Carmen," "Mother," by Thomas; and "On the Road to Mandalay," by Speaks. The male chorus will accompany him on the first and third numbers.

Thomas and Miss Carlisle will sing in duet several selections from Gilbert and Sullivan. Erno Rapee will again conduct the Symphony Orchestra.

Bob Hope With
Rippling Rhythm Revue

NEW YORK, May 6—Bob Hope, bringing along with him his heckler-in-chief, Honeychile, will take over the Rippling Rhythm Revue beginning Sunday, May 9. The weekly broadcasts, heard over the NBC-Blue network at 9 p.m., EDT, will feature Hope as master-of-ceremonies and in comedy sketches with Honeychile.

Hope, now featured in the Cole Porter musical comedy, "Red, Hot and Blue," is quitting the show at Chicago to take charge of the Radio City broadcasts of the Rippling Rhythm Revue. Prior to his appearance in "Red, Hot and Blue," he was the comedy hit of "Roberia."

Frank Parker, NBC tenor who on March 7 last celebrated his 10th anniversary in radio, will continue to be featured as the soloist of the programme, and Shep Fields and his orchestra will continue as the Rippling Rhythm orchestra.

Hope and Honeychile succeed the Canovas who have gone to Hollywood to make a picture.

SOLOISTS ON GENERAL
MOTORS CONCERT MAY 9

John Charles Thomas, one of America's favorite baritones, and Kitty Carlisle, singing star of the operetta stage and the motion pictures, will be the soloists of the General Motors Promenade Concerts programme on Sunday night, May 9.

These two artists will sing with the General Motors Symphony Orchestra augmented by the male chorus lately added, with Erno Rapee conducting. A nation-wide hook-up of NBC-WJZ (Blue) network stations will broadcast the music between 8 and 9 p.m., EDT. The programme will be transmitted from Carnegie Hall in New York.

Music for the broadcast has been selected from the works of such masters and composers as Tchaikowsky, Debussy, Granados, Gounod, Bizet, von Suppe, Tellmesberger, Bland and Speaks. In addition, the programme will be highlighted by the weekly concert presentation, which this Sunday will be a "Concert Presentation of Gilbert and Sullivan."

And in tribute to the fact that the day is "Mother's Day"—Thomas will sing his own composition entitled "Mother." This is the song he sang last year on a special broadcast for the Good Will Foundation, in its "Mother's Day" programme, and which since he composed it has become one of his concert audiences' chief favorites.

In the Gilbert and Sullivan presentation—in especial arrangement for the Promenade Concert—will be heard "The Major General's Song" from the "Pirates of Penzance;" "The Sun and I" from "The Mikado;" "All in All Since That Fond Meeting," from "Iolanthe;" "For He Is An Englishman," from "Pinafore." Taking part will be Thomas, Miss Carlisle, the 16-voiced male chorus and the symphony orchestra, with Rapee conducting.

Thomas is, of course, widely known throughout the world as one of its greatest baritones. He is also well known as an enthusiastic boatman, and is commonly called by his intimates by the cognomen of "Commodore." He owns no less than a fleet of ten boats, including his latest acquisition, an 80 foot houseboat.

What is not so widely known is the fact that in his school days he was a great football and track athlete. In 1908 records were not so advanced as they are now, but Thomas then ran a mile in five minutes and cleared the high-jump bar at five feet 10 and a half inches—performances that were excellent at that time. In football he played against the famous Indian, Jim Thorpe, of Carlisle.

Kitty Carlisle is from New Orleans. As distinguished from some of the young singers who have appeared on the Promenade Concerts programmes lately and whose musical training was, in so many cases, entirely American, Miss Carlisle was brought up entirely in European musical circles. This happened because her mother lived almost entirely in Europe after her father, a prominent physician in the Louisiana city, had passed on. Her steps in professional life, although her training had been for the

HOLLYWOOD, May 6—Ann Harding will make one of her rare radio appearances as guest star on the premiere broadcast of the new Chase and Sanborn Hour beginning Sunday, May 9. She will join her husband, Werner Janssen, musical director of the programme, for the first time on the air.

Miss Harding will play a dramatic sketch as her part of the show which features Don Ameche, as master-of-ceremonies; Janssen directing the orchestra; and Ventriloquist Edgar Bergen and his dummy "Charlie McCarthy" as the comedy stars.

As this broadcast, over the NBC-Red network at 8 p.m., EDT, Miss Harding will hear her husband conduct for the second time in her life.

A month ago she heard him direct a Sibelius concert in Finland, with the composer present, but the new Chase and Sanborn Hour will mark the first time she has heard him in this country.

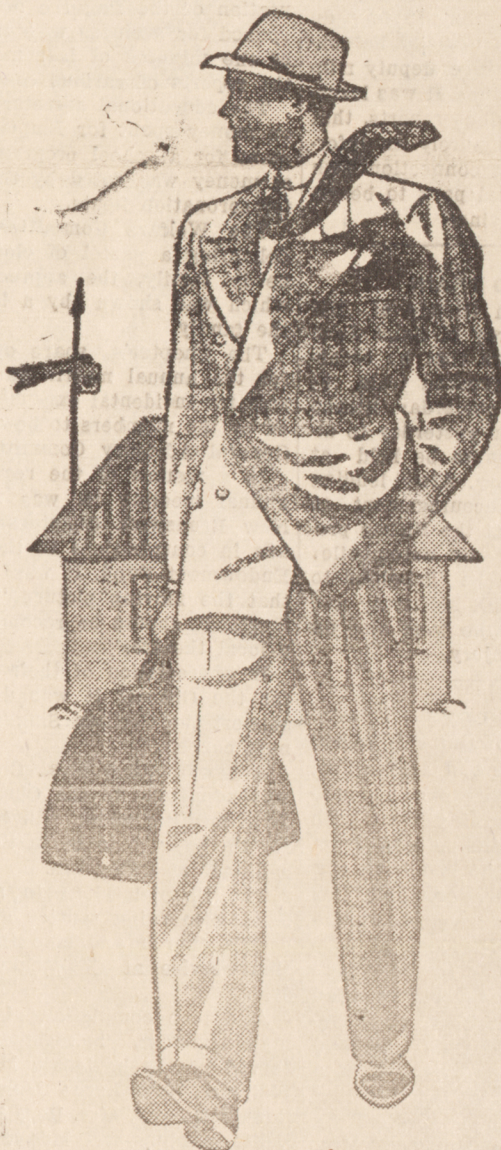
