HEROIC EXEMPLAR OF MOTHER LOVE TO RECEIVE KATE SMITH'S AWARD IN COMMAND APPEARANCE TONIGHT

\$1,000 Award For The Heroism of Mother Who Rescued Children From Burning Home

Responding to the letters of her far-flung radio audience, Kate Smith will present Mrs. Peter Weber, 27 year old mother, of Ann Arbor, Mich., in "Command Appearance" on Thursday, Nov. 25, at 9 p.m., AST, via WABC-CBS. The young mother who recently risked her life to rescue her children from their burning home will receive the \$1,000. Award for heroism as the radio's audience's choice of three candidates designated by a distinguished nominating committee that includes J. Edgar Hoover, Admiral Caryl T. Grayson, Elsie Robinson and Dr. James E. West.

Mrs. Lillian Wald and Miss Jessie Simpson will receive cash awards of \$250 each in consideration of the courage and bravery for which they were cited by the nominating committee.

When Kate Smith presents the award to Mrs. Weber, she will review the young mother's heroism in barely escaping with her own life during an unsuccessful attempt to rescue three of her other children from the burning building.

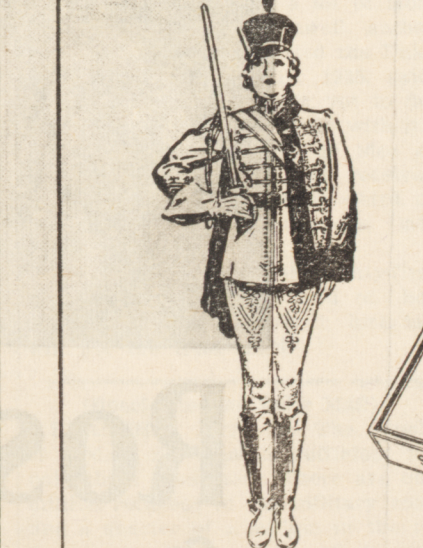
Following the awards, Kate will offer dramatizations of heroic incidents in which three more candidates for "Command Appearance" distinction have been selected by the committee for the nation's No. 1 Choice.

Other highlights of the program will be Kate's singing with the Ted Straeter Chorus, the comedy of Henry Youngman and his "Onkle," Hyman Cantor, Jack Miller's orchestra; a football consultation between Fordham's "Sleepy" Jim Crowley and another outstanding grid mentor, and the co-ordination of producer Ted Collins.

CBC PROGRAM WILL DESCRIBE CAREER OF NOTED LIBERAL

Marshall S. Bidwell To Be Subject Tonight's "Can. Portraits"

TORONTO, Nov. 25 — Marshall Spring Bidwell, who has been described as the first leader of Liberalism in Upper Canada, will be the subject of a broadcast talk on the CBC "Canadian Portraits" series Thursday, Nov. 25, at 10.30 p. m., AST. Professor Chester W. New, of McMaster University, Hamilton, will be the commentator.

Marshall Spring Bidwell was the son of Barnabas Bidwell, Atty-General of Massachusetts. He was raised and educated in Upper Canada, and from 1829-1836 he was recognized as the leader of the Reform Party in the province. He retired from politics and left Canada after the Rebellion of 1837 and in his later years was a distinguished member of the New York Bar.

"Gloom Chasers" To Present Parade Of Lively Numbers

A parade of gay and lively tunes will be sung by "Alf and Bernie," harmony duo, on the CBC presentation, "The Gloom Chasers," to be broadcast over the national network on Thursday, Nov. 25 (tonight) from 8.30 to 8.45 p.m., AST. The short session of snappy tunes and humorous informalities will originate in the Toronto studio, with Terry Jack accompanying "Alf and Bernie" at the piano.

The duo will sing a number of old favorites, including the comedy tune, "There's No One With Endurance"; Gerald Mark's "O Susanna" and last year's hit, "Peter Piper." The current success, "Roses in December," also will be heard.

Prof. New is head of the Department of History at McMaster University. He is a member of the Royal Society of Canada, of the Canadian Historical Association and of other historical societies.

"Sophisticates" To Feature Variety Of Numbers

Lou Snyder and Murray Ross, well known piano duo, will be presented on Thursday, Nov. 25, at 9.15 p.m., AST, over the national network in another of the series of programmes known as "Sophisticates of the Piano."

The piano team will feature their own modern sophisticated arrangements of recent popular successes, and will open the 15-minute presentation with Ernesto Lecuona's impressionistic number, "Jungle Drums." Snyder and Ross also will play "The Moon Got In My Eyes," from Bing Crosby's latest picture, "Double or Nothing"; Reginald Forsythe's witty tune, "Dodging a Divorcee," and the southern negro fantasy, "Song of the Bayou."
