PLYMOUTH, Nov. 25—The body of the late Ramsay MacDonald arrived on a British cruiser today. Malcolm MacDonald, son of the late Premier and his sister, met the body at the boat. It was placed aboard the special train and shipped to London from where it will proceed to Scotland for burial.

MADRID, Nov. 25—Madrid today was subjected to the worst shelling since the start of the Spanish civil war when nearly 2,000 shells were dropped at intervals of ten seconds. Nothing definite has been added to the casualty list, everybody being ordered to the cellars when shells started to explode. Barcelona was also bombed from the air.

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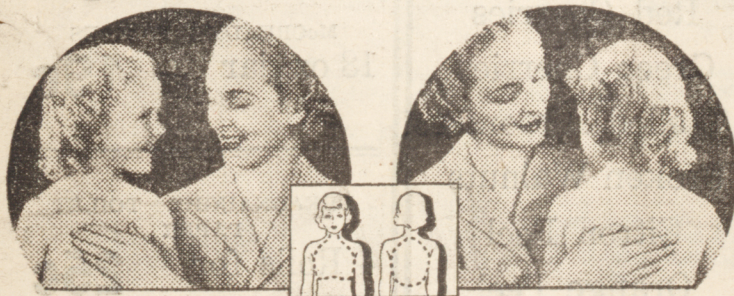

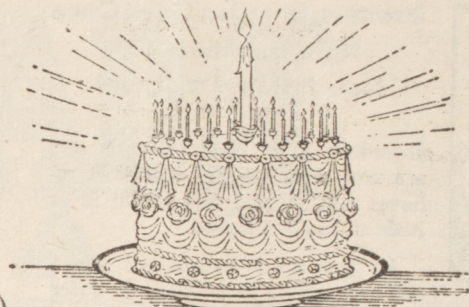

"The end of education is not to provide bread and butter any more than to provide jam. It is to teach people how to face sickness and old age, and possibly be of some comfort to others.
