dian statue but, if he were advised to do so, his actual right of disallowance is not considered to be invalidated by the declaration of the conference.

It is not presumed that Mr. Aberhart contemplates any revolutionary process by physical force, and that even if he did, the capacity of legal authorities to carry out any such edict in a matter so technical as banking is not conceived of.

What apparently he intends to do is to try to carry out the statutes. This no doubt would be resisted by the affected interests. In that case proceedings would be taken against them in the courts for violation of the statute which Mr. Aberhart claims still exist, but which the Dominion Government has cancelled. These cases, which would likely be initiated before a police magistrate, might go through the different courts to the one last resort—the Privy Council in London.

Work Begun Today On Federal Stream Improvement Project

Today construction was begun on two dams on the Burpee Stream in Sunbury County, in preparation for an experiment in stream improvement, said to be the first of its kind in Canada, which is to be conducted by the Federal Department of Fisheries.

The work started today under the supervision of H. A. Lynch, assistant engineer, Department of Fisheries, Ottawa, who spent the last day or so making arrangements for the work. The experiment is similar to those carried on in the State of New York on the small streams in the Adirondack Mountains, division of the state, which so far have been said to be fairly successful in the conservation of fish and better fishing conditions.

By means of these dams water is conserved by building up pools in the stream, so that better food conditions for the trout will exist, to produce bigger and healthier fish for the pleasure of the angler.

The Burpee Stream lies mostly in the game refuge that also is used as the Acadian Forest Experimental Station by the Forest Service of Canada.

Lord Tweedsmuir met C. V. Rowan, Hudson's Bay Company Post Manager, and A. Copland, District Manager for the same company. Mr. Copland conducted him through a warehouse stocked with goods worth more than \$100,000 awaiting transfer to boats going east and west along the Arctic coast.

Wealthy Eskimos

At Tuktoyaktuk, Lord Tweedsmuir found the most intelligent of the western Eskimo, men who in good times with fox-skin prices high made as much as \$25,000 a year, travelled by chartered airplane when they were in a hurry and even flew to Edmonton for their wedding trips.

He learned a wealthy man might buy a ton of coal for \$100 f.o.b. and then pay the freight costs to the point he wanted it landed. He saw tons of merchandise to be taken before winter to Coppermine on Coronation Gulf, Cambridge Bay, King William Land and Victoria Island points where trading, Royal Canadian Mounted Police and mission posts are established.

In the miscellany were bolts of flannelette, bright gingham for Eskimo girls to make summer dresses, silk stockings which some of them wear, traps, fish nets, webbing for dog harness, rifles, ammunition, carpenter's tools outboard motors, canoes, compasses, lumber, nails, paint and building insulation, besides all sorts of groceries and canned goods.

Situation Relieved at Saint John
The danger of the two fires burning in the Spruce Lake district of Saint John county spreading to valuable timber land has been lessened considerably overnight, according to reports received here today. The fire was placed under control last night, and unless the winds shift to the west or southwest, the danger of widespread destruction is definitely past, it was stated.

Rain which has fallen in the Grand Falls district since six o'clock this morning is thought to have put an end to the fire at Burnt Land Brook. One hundred and twenty acres of old burn has been burned over by the flames, according to word received here yesterday when a crew of ninety men were battling the blaze.

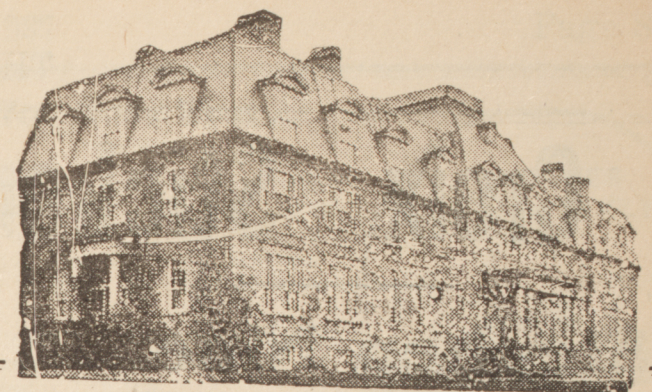
Kent Jct. Fire Out

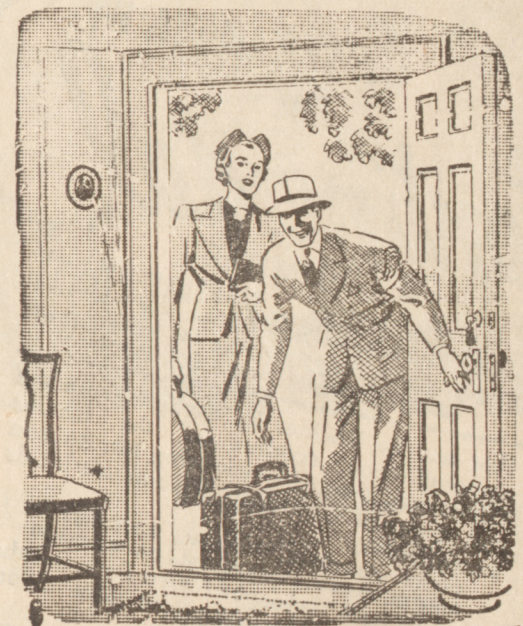
