

# BRUINS, LEAFS, RANGERS WIN N.H.L. GAMES

**RAY GETLIFFE AND GORDIE DRILLON, FORMER MARITIME PUCKSTERS, SHINE BY HANGING UP THREE TALLIES EACH**

**Boston Takes Maroons 4-2; Leafs Beat Amerks 6-3; Rangers Whitewash Red Wings 3-0**

MONTREAL, Nov. 7.—Boston Bruins, who finished second to Detroit Red Wings in their section of the National Hockey League last winter, have developed new strength with the return to health of Eddie Shore and the addition of a brilliant young forward line in Milt Schmidt, Bobby Bauer and Porky Dumart.

Beating Montreal Maroons 4-2 in the season's opener here last night, Bruins displayed the power which may make them serious contenders for the Wings' sectional and league championships.

Ray Getliffe, blond opportunist, who formerly played in Saint John and Charlottetown, scored three Boston goals and Schmidt got the other with Dumart's aid. Shore looked like the Shore who used to make everyone's all-star team.

TORONTO, Nov. 7.—Youth has the first victory over age in this young National Hockey League season.

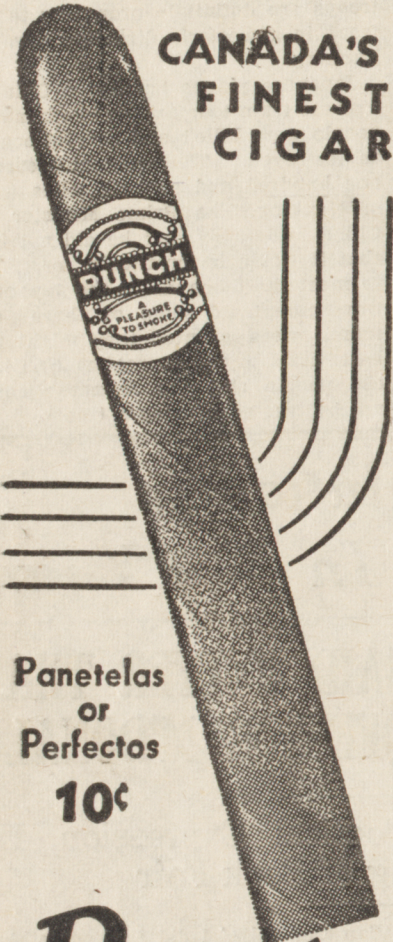

Some 10,000 fans watched Americans take a second-period lead on Eddie Wiseman's goal and hold it until midway through the stanza when Gordon Drillon, former Moncton junior, fired the first of three goals. It was 3-1 for Leafs by the time they skated out for the final period.

Happy Day, a former Leaf, went off for holding in the last minute of the second period and before he came back Drillon had scored two goals, thoroughly sinking the New Yorkers' hopes.

### MAY ADOPT GOLF BALL OF FLOATER TYPE NEXT YEAR

**The Present Ball Has Achieved Ultimate Speed, Is Claim**

Golf ball manufacturers have assured the United States Golf Association that the rabbit pellet which bounds so blithely over Bunkerland has obtained its ultimate speed.

If this be true the worried rulers of the game need harbor no more apprehensions, but is it true? Every year some one has come along with some new-fangled invention which has made the ball livelier. Why not 1938?

That, really, is what the U. S. G. A. fears. For this reason it is understood the governors are continuing their experiments, with a floator ball whose specific gravity is definitely limited. The adoption of such a ball would probably end for all time the frenzied competition among manufacturers and compel them to concentrate their zeal upon the ball's durability.

#### An Even 'Break'

True enough, the floator would not go near as far as the present ball which the veriest duffer can dispatch 200 yards or more, much to his elation and the glorification of his vanity. For a time Mr. Duffer probably wouldn't like the floator any more than would the professionals who like to make the game as easy as possible.

In the end, however, everybody would be placed on the same level and Mr. Duffer would have the satisfaction of knowing that he was playing with a ball no slower than the ones used by the so-called experts.

Mr. Duffer is not aware of it but the ball the professionals use and upon which they are building their reputations as mighty hitters is much faster than those which are dished out to him.

#### Fast Ball For Pros

The big shots who are subsidized by the manufacturers play with a ball whose cover is so thin a faulty shot mares or cuts it however small the deflection may be. Balls made for the average players have thicker, tougher covers which reduce their speed but make them more lasting.

### Tentative Playing Plan Drawn Up At Meeting Yesterday

The Southern New Brunswick Hockey League will open its 1937-38 season with two games on Dec. 3, according to the tentative 6-0 game schedule drawn up in a six-hour meeting of representatives of the league executive and the four member clubs, held here yesterday afternoon and last night. It is planned to get the league underway with St. Stephen meeting the Beavers at Saint John, and Fredericton journeying to Moncton to tussle with the Maroons. The first game played here will be with Moncton on Dec. 14.

No further announcement as to the particulars of the proposed schedule given out because of the fact that the plan must be sent to the various clubs for ratification before its becomes final.

Eighteen delegates, representing the Fredericton, St. Stephen, Moncton and Saint John teams, as well as the league executive, attended the conference. After the schedule had been settled, the coaches of the teams met over the question of referees, two refs being named by each team. It was decided to call a meeting of the referees and coaches at Saint John on Nov. 28.

Among those who attended the meeting were: President Ev. Keating of the S.N.B.H.L., and Frank Gallagher, Moncton; Henry White and 'Dud' James, manager and coach respectively of the Hub aggregation; Hymie Marcus, Herb Gibbs, Harry Doran and 'Mac' McGowan, representing the Beavers; 'Abe' Pulinski and Bill Whitlock of Saint Stephen; and Ernest Beatty and Manager Verne Olive of the local sextet.

### SCHMELING IS EXPECTED IN U. S. NOVEMBER 11

**First Scrap To Be With Harry Thomas At Windy City**

NEW YORK, Nov. 8.—Max Schmeling, who wants to practice a few fumbles before stepping up there to face Joe Louis' pitching next June for the world's heavyweight championship, has sailed from Germany on the Bremen, and, according to Joe Jacobs, his American stepmanager, the fighter will arrive November 11. His first fungo will be Harry Thomas of Chicago.

It seems unlikely now that this fight, scheduled for Dec. 13, will be transferred to Chicago, as had been suggested in an effort to defeat a probable anti-Nazi boycott of Schmeling here.

"We might as well find out whether this boycott is a phony or on the level," said Jake, speaking in his native tongue. "Anyhow the Thomas fight is signed for Madison Square Garden and that's probably where it'll be held."

Thomas was to have been the first of two practice opponents for Schmeling on a sort of dummy-scrimmage basis leading up to the Louis brawl, the other being Ben Foord, the Englishman, in Hamburg on January 30. But it appears now that there may be three, with Miami, Florida, perhaps getting a Schmeling pre-view in late February.

**Herb Gibbs, Saint John Coach to Stack 3 Strong Lines Against Hub Machine**

The Saint John Beavers will stack three forward trios and a pair of balanced defence combinations against the Moncton Maroon in the opening game of the local hockey season at The Forum tonight, according to announcement from Herb Gibbs, newly-appointed coach of the locals following a workout over the week-end. The pre-season exhibition contest between the old rivals will get underway at 8:30 o'clock and St. Mary's Band will be in attendance.

Harry Doran, Toronto import, will center Bobby Beaton and Don Marshall. Pontiac junior graduate, on the only line which has been playing as a unit since practices began last week. Beaton will patrol the left lane and the former star centre of the Pontiacs will play right wing.

Last minute substitution of "Flash" Price for Eddie Burke at centre for another line broke up the Burke, Olsen, Sherwood trio which has been working together at practice sessions. Olsen will take over left wing, and Sherwood will be at right wing.

### Stellarton Winner Maritime Junior Softball Crown

TRURO, N. S., Nov. 7.—Stellarton Checkers won the Nova Scotia junior softball championship on a rain-sodden Victoria Park diamond Saturday with a 7-6 victory over Moncton in a "sudden-death" game for the title.

The Nova Scotia champions staged an uphill fight from the fifth inning, when Moncton went out in front by three runs, and sent the winning run across the plate in the ninth.

The New Brunswick infield played brilliantly, contributing three double plays that nipped threatening Stellarton rallies. Checkers retaliated with two double plays. H. Hale of Stellarton was the batting hero of the game with four hits out of five trips to the plate.

### Plan To Cut 1940 U. S. Olympic Team

NEW YORK, Nov. 8.—The executive committee of the American Olympic Association will meet in Washington, D. C., Nov. 17 to arrange for the 1940 Olympiad in Japan.

The trend will be toward curtailment of the number of competitors and officials.

Boxing and wrestling teams are to have no alternates. No extra relay runners are to be taken along in track and field. They will be picked from regular team members.

Track and field is to have only one assistant manager instead of three. Smaller teams to have no assistant managers or assistant coaches and where possible the office will be combined.
