TORONTO, Nov. 7-Youth has the first victory over age in this young National Hockey League season.

The youthful Toronto Maple Leafs, putting on terrific pressure for so early in the season, handed the slightly-aged New York Americans a 6-3 beating in a wide-open clash here Saturday night. Red Dutton's veterans were no match for the speed of Conny Smythe's youngsters.

Some 10,000 fans watched Americans take a second-period lead on Eddie Wiseman's goal and hold it until midway through the stanza when Gordon Drillon, former Moncton junfor fired the first of three goals. It was 3-1 for Leafs by the time they skated out for the final period.

Happy Day, a former Leaf, went off for holding in the last minute of the second period and before he came back Drillon had scored two goals, thoroughly sinking the New Yorkers' hopes.


