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# CHANGES IN NEW PROVISIONS OF MOTOR VEHICLE ACT OF N. B.

Maximum Weight of Trailers Increased From 1,500 to 2,500 Pounds

The regulation as applied to trailers, recently published in the press under the provisions of the Motor Vehicle Act has been altered. Originally it was provided that passenger cars and light delivery trucks could not have trailers with a gross load over 1,500 pounds. This maximum has now been stepped up to 2,500 pounds in order to take care of house trailers and farmers' light trailers. Announcement to this effect was made this morning in a statement issued by the Department of Public Works.

Warning was also issued to the public to secure license plates early because congestion at the last minute is liable to cause disappointment and delay to many. The offices where Motor Vehicle licenses may be procured at Fredericton, Saint John, Moncton, Saint Stephen, Woodstock, Chatham, Campbellton and Edmundston, will remain open at noon-time and on Saturday afternoons from now until the end of May in order to accommodate the public. License plates may also be procured at the office of the New Brunswick Automobile Association, Charlotte St., Saint John, N.B.

## DOUGLAS F. BROWN WINS A COVETED SCHOLARSHIP

One of Seven in Canada to Win in World Competition

Going to Columbia

Three U.N.B. Men Consult With Trinidad Oil Magnates

The news dispatches yesterday announced that Douglas F. Brown, son of Mr. and Mrs. George W. Brown, Lansdowne Street was amongst the seven Canadians listed among the 167 winners of fellowships for 1937-38 at Columbia University, New York. He has received a residence scholarship in chemistry and will take up his esidence at Columbia in the fall.

This is a signal honor not only to Mr. Brown personally but also to the University of New Brunswick. This cholarship is open to the whole vorld and Mr. Brown is one of seven vinners in Canada.

Mr. Brown who was graduated with B.A. in science in the U.N.B. class of 1936 has during the past year acted as assistant professor of chemistry t his Alma Mater here. He is maoring in chemistry and will receive his M.A. at U.N.B. next year. He will probably complete his studies for a Ph.D. at Columbia when he goes to that University.

Mr. Brown has just returned from New York where he has been in conference with officials of a Trinidad oil concern. He was one of three from U.N.B. who went to New York to consult with one of the officials who flew up from Texas to the conference. The other two were Professor Robert Wright and Hollis Thomas of St. Andrews. The conference which took place at New York may result in one or more of these U.N.B. men being engaged with the

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
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
