There will be a piano recital from Tokyo by Miss Miwako Kai Thursday, August 26th, who recently returned to Japan from Warsaw, Poland, where she participated in the Chopin Festival. 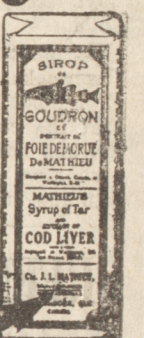
