great aid in helping the unemployment situation and will contribute to stimulate business activities in this area. G. Willard Kitchen and will be considered when the matter is brought up for discussion.

In a recent bulletin issued by Mr. Balch, he referred to the "satin moth" (stipnotia salicis) which has been recently discovered at McAdam, N. B., by W. J. Harris of the entomological laboratory.

It is numerous on a number of the carolina poplars, some of which have been defoliated of a considerable amount of the foliage. At present, the caterpillars are beginning to pupate. The white moths will appear in two or three weeks' time and lay white masses of eggs on the bark. These will hatch during August and the small caterpillars will do a little feeding on the leaves before making small webs in the crevices of the bark to overwinter. It is probable that next year there will be an increase in the numbers, and the caterpillars may cause complete defoliation of some trees and considerable annoyance from crawling around houses.

This European insect has caused a great deal of trouble in Moncton and other parts of Westmorland county. This is the first infestation found outside of Westmorland and Kings counties. Other infestations not known to the laboratory may occur in other parts of southern New Brunswick. Those with planted poplar trees on their property should look for the large hairy caterpillar which has a black back and grey sides but is chiefly distinguished by the row of white marks down the back and tufts of reddish-brown hairs on small raised spots of the same color down the back and sides. The pupae are found in their white cocoons on foliage, trunks or nearby structures. They are black with pale yellowish hairs.

The insect can be easily controlled by spraying with arsenate of lead just as soon as the leaves come out in the spring. Spraying which is delayed until the caterpillars become large enough to be a nuisance is useless.

To the Protestant People of New Brunswick:

Ladies, Gentlemen and Children:

On May 1, 1930, Your Home did not owe one cent. On May 1, 1937, Your Home's indebtedness was \$33,000.00. It is the same today. In this interval of seven years, many children from each and every County have been, and today are being, helped on the road to good citizenship. The Protestant People of the three Counties of Kings, Madawaska and Saint John, have, during the whole of this interval, each carried their share of the maintenance burden. The following statements show the extent to which the Protestant People in each of the other twelve Counties have failed to do likewise.

YORK COUNTY: There are 28,763 Protestant People living in this County. In these seven years they have contributed \$13,979.40 towards maintenance. In this same interval their share of the Undesignated Receipts has amounted to \$28,798.17. Their share, as of May 1, 1937, of the \$33,000.00 Overdraft is \$11,698.88.

VICTORIA COUNTY: There are 8,683 Protestant People living in this County. In these seven years they have contributed \$14, towards maintenance. In this same interval their share of the Undesignated Receipts has amounted to \$8,693.93. Their share, as of May 1, 1937, of the \$33,000.00 Overdraft is \$5,166.51.

NORTHUMBERLAND COUNTY: There are 15,480 Protestant People living in this County. In these seven years they have contributed \$10,769.99 towards maintenance. In this same interval their share of the Undesignated Receipts has amounted to \$15,499.47. Their share, as of May 1, 1937, of the \$33,000.00 Overdraft is \$3,050.32.

CARLETON COUNTY: There are 18,503 Protestant People living in this County. In these seven years they have contributed \$14,523.02 towards maintenance. In this same interval their share of the Undesignated Receipts has amounted to \$18,526.39. Their share, as of May 1, 1937, of the \$33,000.00 Overdraft is \$2,264.27.

KENT COUNTY: There are 3,833 Protestant People living in this County. In these seven years they have contributed \$1,466.98 towards maintenance. In this same interval their share of the Undesignated Receipts has amounted to \$3,837.84. Their share, as of May 1, 1937, of the \$33,000.00 Overdraft is \$1,955.05.

WESTMORLAND COUNTY: There are 30,616 Protestant People living in this County. In these seven years they have contributed \$25,492.35 towards maintenance. In this same interval their share of the Undesignated Receipts has amounted to \$30,654.50. Their share, as of May 1, 1937, of the \$33,000.00 Overdraft is \$1,841.16.

SUNBURY COUNTY: There are 5,732 Protestant People living in this County. In these seven years they have contributed \$3,372.91 towards maintenance. In this same interval their share of the Undesignated Receipts has amounted to \$5,739.22. Their share, as of May 1, 1937, of the \$33,000.00 Overdraft is \$1,744.52.

QUEENS COUNTY: There are 10,010 Protestant People living in this County. In these seven years they have contributed \$7,294.05 towards maintenance. In this same interval their share of the Undesignated Receipts has amounted to \$10,022.62. Their share, as of May 1, 1937, of the \$33,000.00 Overdraft is \$1,642.69.

ALBERT COUNTY: There are 7,145 Protestant People living in this County. In these seven years they have contributed \$4,944.78 towards maintenance. In this same interval their share of the Undesignated Receipts has amounted to \$7,154.00. Their share, as of May 1, 1937, of the \$33,000.00 Overdraft is \$1,534.15.

RESTIGOUCHE COUNTY: There are 7,513 Protestant People living in this County. In these seven years they have contributed \$5,600.73 towards maintenance. In this same interval their share of the Undesignated Receipts has amounted to \$7,522.45. Their share, as of May 1, 1937, of the \$33,000.00 Overdraft is \$1,106.76.

CHARLOTTE COUNTY: There are 18,845 Protestant People living in this County. In these seven years they have contributed \$16,301.82 towards maintenance. In this same interval their share of the Undesignated Receipts has amounted to \$18,868.69. Their share, as of May 1, 1937, of the \$33,000.00 Overdraft is \$522.62.
