## IN THE NEW HATS GREEN PREVAILS

## French Designer Highlights This Color, as Well as Black and White--Trimming Profuse.

PARIS, March 11—Louise Bourbon is the first of the big hat designers to show her spring collection. The most important step she has taken is to abolish entirely the high crown. There isn't a single flowerpot crown in the entire collection.

The small hats have shallow round crowns that are fitted to the head. Some are made with small, upturned brims and fit rather far back on the head. Others have squared or oval crowns that are a trifle elevated and finished with medium-sized brims that dip way down in front but are rather shallow in back. This ought to mean that hair styles will be changed and will be elevated in back to meet the brims of new hats.

There are surprisingly few straws in this collection. Pastel-shaded felts are numerous and all shades of green are shown in preference to other colors. There is much black and white also. Often three or more colors will be ingeniously inserted in a single model. For example, one toque of felt is made of three shades of green and a piece of petunia colored felt.

Trimming is far more ornate than that shown last season. Fancy garlands and bows of ribbons trim many hats, while flowers, fruits, ears of corn, military braiding effected in ribbon and feathers cleverly treated to resemble fish and insects trim others. One hat, for example, is trimmed with a large red lady bug of feathers.

Wide-brimmed picture hats of straw are shown only for afternoon wear in floppy-brimmed straws and felts trim med with flowers. Veils are popular here.
