## MEASURES PASSED BY N.B. LEGISLATURE

The following bills were given third readings in the N. B. Legislature yesterday:

To authorize the town of Devon to issue debentures to redeem St. Mary's Village water debentures falling due in 1937 and 1938; to amend the Succession Duty Act, 1934; to provide for the redemption of \$910,000 provincial debentures falling due in 1938; to authorize the funding of the floating indebtedness of the province;

To provide for the installation of a sprinkler system in the Provincial Building, Saint John; to authorize School District Number 1, parish of Madawaska, to issue debentures; to provide for the redemption of \$500,000 provincial debentures falling due in 1937; to authorize St. Andrews to issue debentures; to dissolve the Kent Northern Railway Company.

### Second Readings

The following bills were read a second time.

To confirm and ratify the action of the board of assessors of taxes for the City of Saint John in accepting returns sworn to before a justice of the peace; to amend an act respecting the levying and assessing of rates and taxes in the City of Saint John; to amend the New Brunswick Credit Union Societies Act; respecting natural products; to amend the Slot Machine Act; to amend the Probate Courts Act.

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### DETAILS NEW DEFENCE LOAN GIVEN

PARIS, March 11—Details of the new defence loan were given today in the chamber of Deputies. Ninety-eight is the issue price with the rate of interest at 4 1/2 per cent. on 60 year bonds. Subscriptions start tomorrow. The first issue will be 47,000,000 pounds, and the interest will be payable in francs, Swiss currency, sterling and dollars. The French Minister of Finance has great confidence in the success of the loan and says that gold is fast returning.

protesting against granting fixed valuation to firms. The labor representative contended that no company which has conducted business for ten years or more should be entitled to fixed valuation.

The bill provides that "During the period between the First day of January, A. D. 1937 and the First day of March, A. D. 1942, the Board of Assessors for the City of Moncton each and every year shall assess the Swift Canadian Company, Limited, its successors or assigns, upon the lands, buildings, plant and undertakings of the said Swift Canadian Company, Limited situated and located within the School district of the City of Moncton, or on any extensions or improvements made by the said Swift Canadian Company, Limited, its successors or assigns, to the said buildings, plant and undertakings upon the present site of the said buildings, plant and undertakings, at the sum of One Hundred Thousand Dollars and no more."

The bill will be considered in private session.

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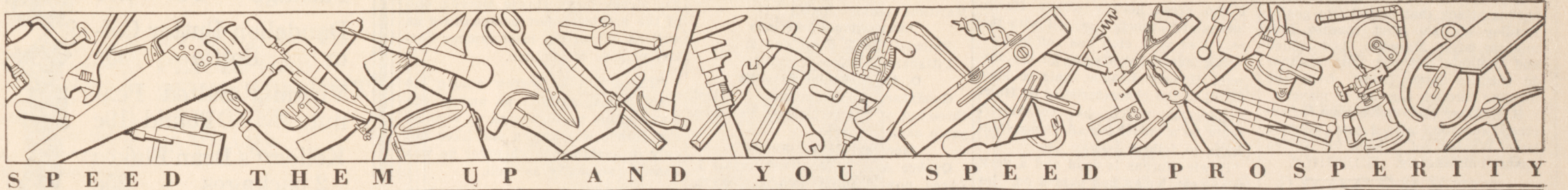
