

Maroons Blast Way into Final Round for Maritime Hockey Honors

Powerful Hub Machine Steamrolled Abbies to Win Semi-Final Series

Captured Last Night's Game 13-6 --- Will Meet N. S. Champs

CHARLOTTETOWN, March 10—A powerful Moncton Maroons' hockey team continued their drive for another Maritime championship here tonight, burying Charlottetown Abbies 13-6 in the second of their home and home series and taking the round 28-8.

Moncton now meets Berwick Bruins for the Maritime title.

Maroons looked good in rolling up the records score for Maritime play-downs. After the first period when the desperate Abbies threw rush after rush at the Maroons' goal and backchecked tirelessly when on the defensive, the New Brunswick champions steamrolled through to score periodically.

Playing before the smallest crowd of the season, Abbies threw everything they had into the first period in a courageous but futile drive to overcome the 13-goal lead Moncton had run up at home.

Maroons forwards were met by a stiff body-checking at the Charlottetown defence. Most of the time they had to chase a Charlottetown player back to their own zone.

McInnis picked up a loose puck just a minute after the opening to give Abbies their first goal. Ten minutes later the frantic Island champions were rewarded again. "Hurry" Jack Kane who came east from Hamilton, Ont., to play in the now defunct "Big Four" League, gave Whalen a pretty pass near the goal mouth and the latter made no mistake.

Maroons came back strong as the period ended and Stull was busy but he kept his citadel intact.

Two minutes after the second period opened Moncton had one of the goals back. Bell and Appleby weaved down and through the Charlottetown defence with Bell flipping home the pass.

Abbies came back in another courageous attack that netted two goals. Bradley got the first counter four minutes after Maroons had tallied and McInnis followed with another 30 seconds later, firing from the blue line through a group of players.

B. LeBlanc took Bell's pass for another Moncton tally a few minutes later. Whalen got it back for Abbies almost immediately.

BERWICK BRUINS N. S. CHAMPIONS

ANTIGONISH, March 10—Berwick Bruins broke the grip of Antigonish Bulldogs on the Nova Scotia hockey championship, here tonight, defeating the defending titlists 5-2 in the second of a two-game total-goal series.

The Apple-Kings, or at least, that is what they called themselves last year, won the right to represent Nova Scotia against Moncton Maroons in the Maritime finals, Eastern preliminaries to the Allan Cup race, by a total score of 7-3. They defeated the Bulldogs at Kentville 2-1 two nights ago.

Before the game began, the players lined up at centre ice and paid silent tribute for two minutes to Howie Morenz, great Montreal hockey player who died Tuesday morning.

The sight was impressive, as the great crowd of fans, most of whom never saw the Stratford Streak, stood with their heads bared before the start of the important game which Bruins went into with a one-goal lead.

On a sticky ice surface which made good passing plays difficult to manage, Berwick took the offensive and increased their lead in the series before settling down to a sound defensive game.

City Girls Blank U. N. B. Co-eds 3-0

The fair sex wound up the hockey season here last night with the city girls applying the whitewash brush to the forces from the college, to the tune of 3 to 2. A large audience sat in at the encounter, and were treated to a rare display of the winter pastime. Thrills and spills galore gammed the contest throughout, and the so-called weaker sex dished up a brand of hockey on a par with that offered by their men rivals, as the U.N.B. co-eds climaxed their week of entertainment for the men folk.

SPORT OFFICIALS MOURN DEATH OF HOWIE MORENZ

MONTREAL, March 10—The death of Howie Morenz brought expressions of sympathy from sport officials in all sections of the continent. Among the many tributes received, were the following:

Ernie Savard, president of Club de Hockey Canadiens, still could hardly believe the tragic death of Howie Morenz: "It is just terrible it is unbelievable," he said. "Yesterday he was supposed to have spent one of the best days in two weeks, and he got up to go to the bathroom and fell dead right there. It is terrible."

"I think Howie was a really great asset to hockey. Besides being a wonderful hockey player, he was a wonderful chap all through. He was the most popular player that ever played the game, not only with the fans but with his team mates and his opponents. It is a great shock to all of us."

Maroon Sympathy
Thomas Arnold, president of the Montreal Professional Hockey Club expressed the sentiments of his club in a wire to Mr. Savard, "I am deeply shocked at the news of Howie Morenz's death. No one admired him more than the Maroon Hockey Club through all the years they have played against one another. Please express our deepest sympathy to his wife.—Montreal Hockey Club."

Senator Donat Raymond, wired from Palm Beach: "Have just heard of death of Howie Morenz. Please convey to his wife and family my deepest regret and my sincere sympathy. In my opinion Howie was the most admired hockey player the world has ever had."

Hon. Fernand Rinfret, Secretary of State, wired from Ottawa: "Have learned with much regret the death of the great hockey player Howie Morenz and associate myself with the real loss your club has suffered."

President Frank Calder, of the National Hockey League, paid a high tribute to the characteristics of Howie Morenz which he considered "could be a model for all young Canadians to follow:

"Howie Morenz is dead and a very, very, gentleman has passed on," he said. "In the 15 years during which he played hockey in the National Hockey League I came to know him well for the qualities he possessed. Apart from those apparent during his performances in his chosen profession. He embodied all that we are accustomed to expect from good sportsmen."

"I never knew him to do a mean thing, but I do recall more than once when an opponent had transgressed against him. Howie was the first to intercede in his behalf. Quite apart from his great ability as a hockey player he should be a model for every young Canadian."

Cecil Hart, manager of the Canadiens, was heart broken when he rushed to St. Luke's Hospital last night on an urgent call "I got down there just after Howie had fallen to the floor, so suddenly that no one was near him. He just got up out of bed, and the nurse told me that he had crumpled up. It is terrible, it is a thunderbolt. I can't believe it—Howie gone."

"From the day I signed him with Canadiens I have always had faith in him, and he never let me down. He played the game from start to finish, and he has been for years the idol of young Canada. Howie was not only a great hockey player, he always played the game with his whole heart and gave of his best. It is a desire to emulate him that he inspired boys to get on skates everywhere in this country, for Howie Morenz stood at the peak as representing all that is best in the game he loved so well."

Tommy Gorman, manager of Maroons who was a consistent advocate of the return of Morenz, and who tried to get him for Maroons last year, was stunned.

"He was the greatest centre man in the history of the game. Howie was a wonderful showman. He always played against teams that I managed but I learned to respect him for his sportsmanship as well as fear him for his skill. He was a grand showman, and one of the finest characters I ever met in sport."

Eddie Gerard, former coach of Montreal Maroons and former defence player with Ottawa Senators in the N.H.L.: "It was a distinct shock to me. His name will go down at the greatest centre ice player of all time."

"Harry Broadbent, former right winger with Montreal Maroons and previously with Ottawa Senators: "I was deeply shocked to hear of the passing of Howie Morenz. His name will go down on the records as one of the greatest centre ice players in professional hockey."

Jim Braddock Receives Offer Approximately More Than Half Million

Schmeling Offers Champ \$250,000 For Title Bout at Berlin Olympic Stadium

NEW YORK, March 10—The unpredictable heavyweight championship situation, headed variously for New York, Chicago and the law courts, picked up another possible destination today as it rolled merrily on with the titleholder Jim Braddock receiving two more offers approximately \$650,000.

Max Schmeling, who earned a chance at regaining the title when he butchered Joe Louis with his right hand last summer offered Braddock \$250,000 cash and American motion picture and broadcasting rights, calculated to produce around \$150,000 more, if he'll put the title on the line in the 1936 Olympic Stadium in Berlin with Schmeling in the other corner.

Scanlan neglected, however, to say where the money would come from, in addition to which authoritative information, from German sources, indicated that Schmeling, rather than Scanlan had the benefit of official Berlin backing.

Schmeling said he made the offer "on behalf of the Deutschland Halle Athletic Club, which is the largest sporting organization in Europe."

"I am ready to post a forfeit of \$25,000 that, if I should win the title I will defend the title in the United States in September, 1937, against Louis or any person who may be considered the outstanding challenger, on a percentage basis," said Schmeling.

Gould, who already has Braddock signed to two bouts in the brief space of three weeks, as usual, was in a receptive mood. With a few alterations, none of which Schmeling and the Deutschland Halle A. C. are likely to agree to, he indicated he might accept Max's offer.


