Provision of Bill

The Bill provides "that the Captain of the Salvage Corps of the City of Moncton and any person employed within said City as a Volunteer Fireman or Substitute Volunteer Fireman, shall be entitled to the discount allowed for the then current year on an amount only of his taxes equal to the salary to become due of December of the then current year and no interest shall be chargeable on so much of his said taxes if paid in full on or before the twentyfirst day of December in the year in which such assessment is made. No discount shall be allowed on any taxes assessed against any such to his said salary, unless such excess is paid on or before the twentyfifth day of June and such excess shall be subject to the regular interest rate on overdue taxes from and after the twenty-fifth day of June in each year and until paid. The discount and exemption herein allowed to the said Captain of the Salvage Conps, Volunteer Firemen and Substitute Firemen is hereby made retroactive as from the first day of January, A. D. 1936.

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
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
