"Oh, who, who will be my Valentine? Then Earth, in a whisper, softly said: 'My water you drink—you eat my bread—"

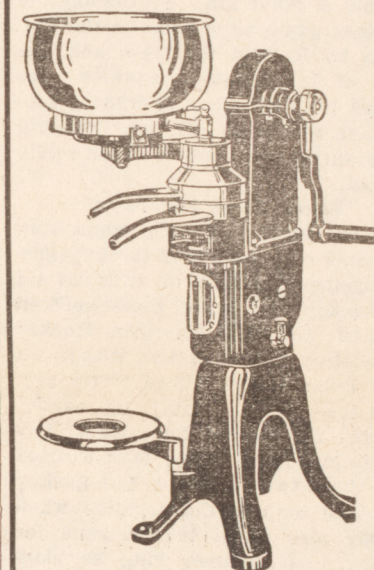
Why look you to winds, or things above,
