NEW RADIO SERIES TO CONDUCT HUNT FOR YOUNG TALENT

"Rising Musical Stars" Will Make NBC Air Debut Tomorrow

11 TO 11:30 P. M.

\$500 Award Monthly; \$1,000 Grand Prize to Chosen Artists

"Rising Musical Stars", a new series which will conduct a search for outstanding instrumental and vocal talent, will debut on Sunday, October 17, over the NBC-Red Network, from 11.00 to 11.30 p. m., AST. This program, sponsored by Sealtest Inc., will replace the current "Sunday Night Party."

Regularly featured will be Alexander Smallens conducting an orchestra composed of members of the New York Philharmonic Orchestra; Hans Fuerst, directing a mixed chorus of 70 voices; and Richard Gordon who will serve as commentator.

The idea of aiding promising musical artists to project their talent via the microphone was suggested by Mme. Yolanda Merio-Irion, President of the Women's National Radio Committee who will supervise the series.

A Jury of Auditions, comprising Alexander Smallens, Alma Gluck and Ernest Schelling, will select the musical candidate for each week's program. The series will be presented in three cycles of four weeks. Following the first cycle, the artist whose talent is outstanding will be chosen by a Committee on Awards, composed of the aforementioned, and other such distinguished musical leaders as Efram Zimballist, Myra Hess, Olga Samaroff Stokowski and Ernest Hutcheson.

Each person selected to appear on these programs will be given a gold medal. The winner of each four-week cycle will be awarded a prize of \$500. To the outstanding artist of the entire series, who will appear on the thirteenth program, the committee will award a first prize of \$1,000.

Sealtest's "Rising Musical Stars" will present both the young musician and the seasoned artist who have not achieved stardom.

MELODIC STRINGS ON CBC MONDAY

Alexander Chuhaldin and his famous "Melodic Strings" orchestra will feature Theodore Gerlach's "Serenade in B Major, Opus 3" in six parts, for the concert to be broadcast over the CBC national network on Monday, October 11, at 10.00 p. m. AST.

Theodore Gerlach was inspired to write the composition to be featured on the program by reading the following passage from "Romeo and Juliet": "How silver-sweet sound lovers' tongues by night, like softest music to attending ear." The six parts to be played are (1) The music marching on; (2) Serenade; (3) Moon Shine Night; (4) Duet—Violin and Cello; (5) Intermezzo—Rallyery, and (6) Separation.

The orchestra will open this half hour of fine music by offering "Polonaise Militaire, Opus 40, No. 1", by Frederic Chopin.

Sedley Brown and Allie Lowe Miles, who conduct the Husbands and Wives program on NBC, have discovered that radio is no part-time job. Although the period occupies but half an hour weekly, it requires so many hours of preparation that the co-directors have been obliged to forego all other activities.

CBC BROADCAST TO TELL ROMANCE SAMUEL CUNARD

N. S. Shipping Pioneer Subject of Drama Series Programme

SUNDAY, OCT. 10

Cunard Responsible For Establishing Line that Owns "Queen Mary"

Samuel Cunard, the Nova Scotian ship owner, whose enterprise and diplomacy changed ocean travel from weeks on a sailing vessel to a fourteen-day journey over steam, will be honored by the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation in the drama series, "Within These Walls", on Sunday, October 10, at 10.00 p. m. AST.

The story of Cunard's rise from modest marine business in Halifax to international recognition and honors climaxed in the bestowing upon him of a Baronetcy in 1859, will be told in this original radio drama by Berton E. Robinson, which will be produced from the Toronto studios by Rupert Lucas.

Cunard established, in 1839, the British steamship company which became the Cunard Steamship Company in 1878. "Within These Walls" will recall, from the scene of Cunard's earliest activities, the career of this Canadian who sought and won the support of the British government in founding the first steamship mail service between England and America. Out of Cunard's fine courage and vision came the voyage of the "Britannia", the fleet of ocean ferries, the mighty Queen Mary, pride of the oldest passenger line on the Atlantic.

Old Beliefs Fall Before the Feats of McCluskey

OLD BELIEFS—SPORT In the face of definite accomplishment we are forced, at times, to abandon old beliefs.

There is the case of Joe McCluskey. Several years ago Joe was a college star at Fordham. He was an outstanding figure in the steeplechase, cross country and anything above the mile.

But Joe ran often and hard and after graduation he continued to win as a club athlete. Then he slowed down a bit and it was generally felt that he was through, had burned himself out with so much competition. That was the idea that held good in Joe's case, and in hundreds of other cases.

But at the age of 26, a veteran of eight years of national competition, Joe is better today than he ever was. This is proved by the fact that he set a new record, an American record, for the four miles. He ran it this fall in 19 minutes and 45 seconds which was faster by 17 seconds than the time made by Hanes Kolehmainen 24 years ago.
