In view of the improvement in the Infantile Paralysis situation in the Province generally, the Hon. J. B. McNair, acting minister of Health and Labor, advises, that the Provincial Normal School and all Public Schools in the Province with the exception of the schools in the city of Saint John and in the Parishes of Lancaster and Simonds in Saint John County and the Rothesay and Hampton Consolidated Schools, may be opened on Tuesday, October 12, 1937.

Should particular instances arise in which the Health Board considers that individual schools should remain closed for particular periods the trustees will be so advised by the District Medical Health office as provided for under the Health Act.

With the reservations above mentioned the foregoing, in effect, becomes an order.

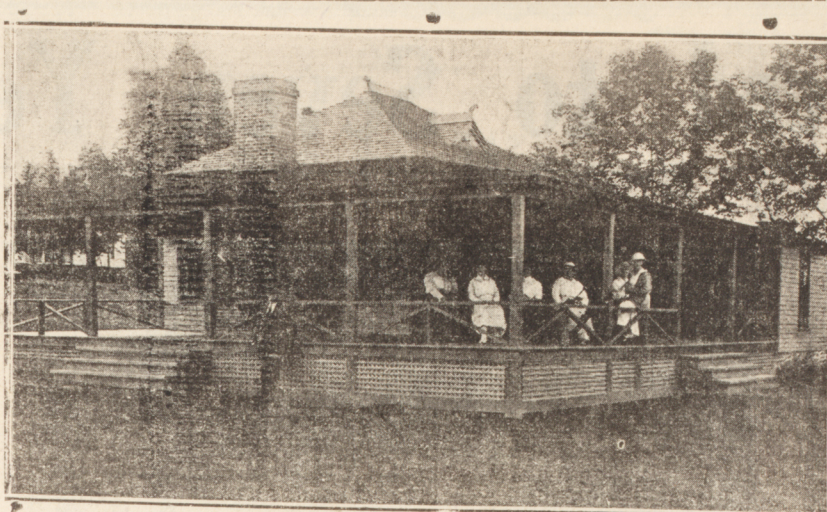

trees and, as a rule, this does not occur for several years after the first noticeable injury. Mr. Balch explained, adding that white spruce is more susceptible than black.

Many Parasites Freed

A large number of parasites have been liberated in the province this year and the companies and forest service have co-operated in this work. These liberations, however, are still experimental and it is not known whether the parasites have a chance of controlling the infestation where it has already become heavy. Two species are being recovered from the forest in sufficient numbers to indicate their permanent establishment.

A permanent study station has been established on Young's Brook, a tributary of the Nashwaak, with the co-operation of the Provincial Department of Lands and Mines, Mr. Balch revealed.

The larch sawfly has increased in numbers this year and caused defoliation of most stands in the southern half of the province. An imported parasite which has controlled this sawfly in Manitoba and parts of Ontario and Quebec is being established in New Brunswick and Nova Scotia in the hope that it may prevent the widespread killing of larch which occurred a generation ago.
