The item refers to Miss Barker as a native of Cork, Ireland. Miss Barker was born in that city during the war when her father was stationed there with his regiment. After referring to a Montreal debutante the item reads as follows:

"It's a jump from Montreal to Fredericton, N. B., but jumps are nothing to a girl like Miss Mary Barker, an 18 year old colleen from Cork, Ireland. Miss Barker is not as Irish as she sounds, coming as she does from a United Empire Loyalist family that settled on a Crown grant when their British sentiments sent them pell-mell out of Uncle Sam's country after the Boston tea party.

Her father is Major Theodore C. Barker, aide-de-camp to Lieut. Governor Murray MacLaren of New Brunswick, and her grandfather served eight lieutenants governor in the same capacity. She made her debut several months ago at a state ball held at the provincial government house.

Miss Barker runs the gamut of deb activities. She is famous locally for her chocolate cakes, her self-made knitted suits, her sportsmanship and her cocker spaniel "Yorkie." She is an amateur actress of ability, and her idea of the ideal male is "a good dancer, a fair conversationalist and a well-groomed appearance."
