## FEAR USED BY STRIKE ORGANIZERS

Consider Change  
Route C. N. Freight  
Via Fredericton

The matter of urging the changing of the route of transcontinental Canadian National Railways freight traffic from the present roundabout route to Saint John via McGivney Junction and Moncton, to the new and shorter route via McGivney, Devon and Fredericton is being considered at this afternoon's meeting of the Transportation Committee of the Fredericton Board of Trade, held at the City Club.

As forecast by The Daily Mail earlier this week, the meeting is considering the necessity of repairs to the roadbed between McGivney and South Devon in order to enable it to handle the heavier amount of traffic which will pass over it if the route is adopted after the new C. N. R. bridge here is completed.

Ban on Presence of Children at Gatherings Is Also Lifted

## No New Cases

Health Authorities Believe Infantile Paralysis Outbreak Over

The schools of Saint John County, the parishes of Lancaster and Simonds in Saint John County, and those of Rosetown, Hampton and Sussex will re-open on Monday, Oct. 25, it was announced today by Hon. Dr. A. P. Paterson, Minister of Education, Federal and Municipal Relations.

The schools of those sections have been closed since Sept. 7 because of the prevalence of infantile paralysis, with the exception of those of Sussex, which re-opened only to close again when more cases of the disease broke out.

At the same time, stated the minister, the ban on the attendance of children under 16 years of age at public gatherings will also be lifted.

With no cases of infantile paralysis reported anywhere in the province since Sunday, when the total for New Brunswick was raised to 150 by the discovery of a mild case at Saint John, provincial health authorities are of the opinion that the dread disease has run its course, and that few, if any, further cases may be expected this year.

The falling off of the number of cases is attributed to the long period of cool weather experienced in New Brunswick.

N. B. Scalors' Exams

L. Richard Black, son of M. W. Black and the late Mrs. Black, 170 Waterloo Row, was the only local candidate who passed the provincial scalors' examination held recently at Campbellton, it was announced by G. L. Miller, chief forester and chairman of the board of examiners. Of the 31 candidates who wrote the exams, only nine passed, it was stated.

Duthie, New Richmond, Que.; John H. McCallum, Tabusintac; J. D. Lavasseur, White Brook; and W. C. McLenahan, Campbellton.

Beside the chairman, W. W. McCormack, chief scaler of the province, and R. A. McFadden, both of Fredericton, are members of the examining board.

U.M.W. Tells Strikers  
They Cannot Work If  
Not Union Members

"Communitistic Gospel," States W. Benton Evans; Men Stated As Wanting To Abandon Strike And Return To Work; Feeling Still High

Reports from reliable sources that the element of fear has been used by strike organizers in the Minto area to the extent that the men believe that unless they join the union they will be unable to secure labour anywhere in the province, brought indignant statements from operators in the district today.

These tactics have been used to such an extent, it was learned from informed sources today, that strike organizers have influenced the men into believing that woods operations, the power plants and other large labour employing industries will be in control of the union, and that those who have not membership cards from the union will be excluded from employment.

## "Communitistic Gospel"

"Tactics such as these which I have been reliably informed are being used by the organizers to further their cause, is straight communitistic gospel," stated W. Benton Evans, one of the larger operators in the district, today. Mr. Evans further said that such means, are universally used by the Committee Industrial Organization to gain its objective, but he stated that he did not feel that the effects of such propaganda would remain long on people of this province.

General indications are that the effect is already wearing off and the union is losing their grip on the men. Well informed sources stated this morning that many men have expressed themselves as intending to return to work the first of the coming week unless developments promised by the union leaders are forthcoming. It was further stated that the miners are reported to have requested D. W. Morrison, president of district 26, United Mine Workers of America, to return to the district, and to have received the reply that he was too busy to return.

## Some Return To Work

A few more men returned to work in the various mines today, but no great numbers which would proclaim a decisive victory for the operators.

Feeling between the two factions, the union and non-union men, is running high, it was stated. One man expressed the feeling as being worse than at election time; then, friends, although fighting on opposite sides, will still speak to each other, but in this situation friends of years' standing pass each other without recognition.

One group, however, comprised of both union and non-union men declared today that union or no union, they are going back to work the first of next week. Promises made by the leaders have not been carried out, they were quoted as declaring, and we have reached the point where it seems that the promises were made without foundation.

The striking miners held a meeting this afternoon in the Union Hall, but the purpose or results of this gathering could not be learned at press time.

Lockhart of Moncton, attended.

In the afternoon a business session was held when matters pertaining to the organization were dealt with and it was shown the membership had substantially increased during the past year.

A banquet was held last night in the Hotel Brunswick at which the newly elected president presided.
