LANNY ROSS IS GUEST OF YALE WHIFFENPOOFS

Lanny Ross, best-known alumnus of the Order of Whiffenpoofs at Yale, will be a studio guest of the college singing group when they make their radio debut on Jack Oakie's College, Tuesday, Jan. 5, at 9:30 p.m., EST, over the WABC-CBS network.

The young tenor star of the Showboat series will occupy a place of honor at the CBC New York Playhouse, as the Whiffenpoofs contribute their share of the programme, singing the songs that have made them famous in campus musical circles.

Ross is the only radio star from the ranks of the Whiffenpoofs, an order which is so exclusive that it comprises only fifteen members of Yale's vast undergraduate body. He made his radio debut while a Whiffenpoof, back in May, 1928, a month before his graduation. At that time, he was a member of a Yale Whiffenpoof quartet which sang over the NBC network as the "Jeddo Highlanders."

The current group contains stars of various musical ensembles, and is directed by John S. Griswold, leader of the Yale Glee Club. In addition to the Whiffenpoofs, Benny Goodman's orchestra will broadcast from New York.

The Hollywood contingent, headed by ebullient Jack Oakie as the president of an imaginary college, will feature George Jessel as a visiting professor, John Boles in solo numbers, and Judy Garland as a co-ed. Georgie Stoll's orchestra will be heard from the film colony.
