WEEK OF PRAYER

PREMIER HERE TODAY

Premier A. A. Dymally arrived here last night from his home in Buctouche and this morning was busy at routine matters at his office in the parliament buildings. A meeting of the provincial government is scheduled for tomorrow. None of the other cabinet ministers have yet arrived in the city.

ORGANIZER AT PR. WILLIAM

S. W. Keohan, registrar of Credit Unions in New Brunswick visited Prince William last night where he addressed a church club organization, who are interested in Credit Union study. The establishment of such a Union is expected there shortly. Mr. Keohan will visit Saint John on Thursday, and will be at St. Stephen on Sunday and Monday.

DIED AT GRAND FALLS

The sad news was received here this morning of the death at Grand Falls, N. B., of Dr. L. Chapman. He is survived by his wife and five children, three sons and two daughters. Miss Mary Chapman, one daughter, is employed in the Department of Lands and Mines in this city, and Miss Gertrude, also is employed in this city at the present time. Funeral arrangements have not yet been made.

PUMPER ON WAY

The motor pumper of the Fredericton fire department, which was wrecked in a collision here in November and which has been undergoing repairs at Woodstock, Ont., will be returned here by the end of the present week, completely ready for use again. Factory tests proved that the gallonage delivered by the pumper was exactly as before the accident. The braking qualities of the newly repaired truck are twice the effectiveness of the old ones, it is learned.

ADDRESSED MEETING

The Fredericton Garrison's Officers Mess held their usual Monday night meeting last night, during the course of which delightful refreshments were served. The feature of the evening was an interesting address delivered by J. L. Neville, the guest speaker. Mr. Neville spoke on several of the early historical figures along the Saint John river, dwelling in particular on the journey from Saint John to Quebec of Lord Edward Fitzgerald, which occurred in 1789. He referred also to Lord Edward's subsequent career in the Old Country, where he was an outstanding figure. Major Dodge acted as chairman of the meeting. A suitable resolution of thanks was tendered Mr. Neville on his comprehensive address.

BUSINESS MEN'S GYM CLASS

The Business Men's Health Class of the Community "Y" got under way yesterday at 5 p.m., at Brunswick gym under the direction of the "Y" secretary. Each member was checked over by a physician before going on the floor. Setting up exercises were indulged in for the first ten minutes. He said, however, that he was building his exercises according to plan so that no muscles would be forgotten and he put the business men through some wonderful twists and turns to accomplish this. The exercises were followed by a few brisk games of volleyball and shower baths. The class meets again on Thursday afternoon for another workout and will meet every Monday and Thursday during the winter season.

MAGISTRATE'S BILL FOR 1936 WAS HALVED

Cost of Police Court Cases This Year Only \$883.35

Less Crime Here?

Ald. Hagerman Wants Tax Payment Limit Extended

The city council at its January committee meeting last night learned that the bill of the Fredericton police magistrate for the year 1936 amounted to \$883.35. The cost of different cases in the police court, as shown by the magistrate's bill, totalled \$1,723 in the year 1935.

The wide difference in the two years was deemed by Ald. F. S. Mundle to be caused by the fact that the relief camps have been suspended since last year and this has caused a decrease in crime in this area, many cases having come from the relief camps in the opinion of Ald. Mundle.

Ald. T. Earle Doohan, chairman of the administration of justice committee, states that in 1931, before the relief camps were established, the cost to the city was \$1,468. This year's expenses in this regard are the lowest in eight years.

Cost of relief in the city for December was \$1,329.06, as compared with \$2,819.46 for December 1935. Last month there were 49 family heads on relief and 107 dependents as compared with 180 heads of families and 395 dependents in December, 1935. Ald. Mundle, chairman of the Municipal home committee who made the report, informed the council that 50 heads of families were on the verge of relief this month.

Ald. Ray T. Forbes proposed that the city pass a strongly worded resolution objecting to the recent and frequent interruptions in the electric light service of Maritime Electric Co., Ltd. The resolution, he said, should express the disappointment of the citizens generally.

More Chance For Voters

Ald. Murray E. Hagerman advised that the tax payment date limit to give citizens a chance to vote in case of an election, be extended until December 31. At the present time the time limit is December 12. Ald. Hagerman suggested that the assessor make out a supplementary list of ratepayers. He believed that the extension of time limit would foster more interest in civic elections and also prove a "revenue getter." The matter will be referred to the legislation committee.

Ald. McCaughey in this regard said that anyone with 50 per cent. of his taxes paid should be permitted to vote. At present the regulation respecting payment of taxes and voting is not fair to the property holder, or the big tax payer since the latter cannot vote at all unless all his taxes are paid, and oftentimes his taxes are large.

It was Ald. Mundle's opinion that any man should be allowed to vote if his poll tax is paid.

Wish Exemption From Taxation Improvements Under Home Loan Act

At last night's January committee meeting of the city council, Mayor G. Willard Kitchen read a letter from J. Bacon Dickson, deputy attorney-general, addressed to City Treasurer F. I. Haviland. The letter was in respect to exemption from taxation of improvements made under the Federal Home Loan Act. L. F. Tingley, city clerk of Moncton suggests that the government promote and Act either providing for exemption of such improvements for a period of two or three years or providing that the municipalities may, at its option, exempt such improvements for a period of two or three years.

The city council will take the matter under consideration.

CHAMBERS TODAY

Mr. Justice Grimmer of Saint John was in the city today and this morning presided at Chancery court in the Supreme Court chamber. Several cases were docketed.

CONTRACT FOR NEW QUEEN ST. BUILDING LET

N. B. Contractors, Ltd., Get Contract For \$25,000

Work Begins at Once

Next to Ryan Building, New Structure Will Be Similar

The contract for the erection of the new building on Queen street near Carleton street and on the site of the former Calder property, next to the Ryan building, was let to New Brunswick Contractors, Limited, of this city today. The approximate price is \$25,000. Work on the new building will commence at once.

The demolition of the old wooden building will begin at once. The tenders, four in all, were considered by Capitol Properties, Limited, of Moncton. The two tenants now on the site will remove shortly. There are Van's Dress Shop which will remove to the old Central Trust Company site on Queen street, and Valensky's which are to remove to the old Hunt & McDonald building on Queen St. The Central Trust Company will remove to the new Ryan building on Queen St., second floor.

The new building will be an annex to the Ryan building and will be 60 feet deep with a 44-foot front. It will be a brick building with floors of structural steel and reinforced concrete slabs. The Queen St. front will be faced with pre-cast reconstructed stone of imitation Indian limestone, similar to the Bank of Montreal. The building will be modern in design with all projecting members eliminated. The store facings will be of reconstructed granite, grayish in shade.

There will be a double store front with the offices of the Central Trust Company in the middle. Entrance will be made through the Ryan building elevator. Three floors will comprise the structure and the heating will come from the Ryan building heating plant. Formerly the old Candy Kitchen and the Crewdson interests occupied the site of the new building.

Allan Parker Glasier, Son of Parker Glasier, Dies

Death came to a prominent resident of Lincoln yesterday in the person of Allan Parker Glasier, aged 48, after an illness of three months. Deceased was the son of the late Parker Glasier, and Sarah Bliss Glasier, one-time prominent in provincial politics and a famous river man in his day, as well as farmer. Mrs. Glasier was the daughter of the late John Sinclair of Rusagons.

Surviving are his wife and three daughters, Mrs. Walter Blizzard of Lincoln; and Misses Marion and Charlotte also of Lincoln; also three brothers, Murray and Fred of Lincoln, and George Glasier, of Marysville; one sister, Mrs. Duff Mitchell, of Saint John. Three grandchildren also survive, Marion, Elizabeth, Theodore and Frederick. Deceased was well known throughout the country and he was a relative of the Bliss and Roberts families. He was at one time a prominent Orangeman.

The funeral will take place on Wednesday afternoon with service at 2:30 o'clock at the home, service to be conducted by Rev. Mr. Ricker. Interment will be made in the Glasier Burial grounds at Lincoln.

RENOVATION AT PARLIAMENT BLDG. SOON COMPLETED

Workmen Removing Part of Staging Today

W. B. Dayton in Charge

Desks of Members Get Overhauling and Varnishing

Renovation work which has been going ahead at the Parliament buildings in recent weeks will be completed within two weeks it was said today by W. B. Dayton, who is in charge of the work.

Today the workmen were busy removing the elaborate network of staging in the Assembly chamber where the bulk of the work has been carried out, including repainting and decorating, and papering. The papering has already been completed and the last touches of painting and retouching are now in process.

The final phase of the work includes the revarnishing of the desks of the members of the legislature and the workmen this morning were scrubbing the desks preparatory to painting.

The assembly chamber has been cleaned from top to bottom, the first thorough overhauling in 22 years. Curtains for the windows will arrive here from Toronto within a few days and will be hung at once.

Mr. Dayton said today that the present is the third occasion on which he worked on such a project in the parliament buildings. The first time he was in charge of such work was 42 years ago.

EGG LAYING CONTEST

The ninth week of the 17th New Brunswick Egg Laying Contest, conducted at the Dominion Experimental Station, here, was concluded on Jan. 2, with a production of 382 eggs and 350.5 points. This is an average production of 20.2 per cent. The Single Comb White Leghorns owned by Arthur Pringle, Stanley, led in production for the week with 36 eggs and 39 points. The Barred Rocks owned by W. J. White, Moore's Mills, were in second position for the week with 37 eggs and 37.3 points. The Barred Rocks owned by Arthur L. Graham, Hoyt Station, were in third position with 36 eggs and 30.6 points.
