New Structure Will Be Similar

The contract for the erection of the city today. The approximate price is \$25,000. Work on the new building will commence at once.

The demolition of the old wooden building will begin at once. The tenders, four in all, were considered by Capitol Properties, Limited, of Moncsite will remove shortly. There are Van's Dress Shop which will remove to the old Central Trust Company site on Queen street, and Valensky's which are to remove to the old Hunt & McDonald building on Queen St, The Central Trust Company will remove to the new Ryan building on Queen St., second floor.

The new building will be an annex to the Ryan building and will be 60 feet deep with a 44-foot front. It will be a brick building with floors of structural steel and reinforced concrete slabs. The Queen St. front will be faced with pre-cast reconstructed stone of imitation Indian limestone, similar to the Bank of Montreal. The building will be modern in design with all projecting members eliminated. The store facings will be of reonstructed granite, grayish in shade
