#### POLICE AGENT TESTIFIES IN LIQUOR CASE

Herbert Beatty Given Jail Sentence ---Fined \$200

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#### **CONTINUED DAMP** WEATHER CHECKS SEED OPERATIONS

Many Farmers Abandon Grain Planting ---Wet Ground

HOPE SEEN

Grain crops in this section of the province are threatened with failure as result of continued wet weather, according to the views expressed by several of the leading agriculturists in the Fredericton area. C. F. Bailey, superintendent of the Dominion Experimental Station here, stated today that weather conditions, sime ilar to those now existent, have not been experienced in this part of New Brunswick for more than a quarte century. Planting operations, delay ed weeks by the abnormal rainfall are not completed yet in many sections of the district. Farmers, particularly those whose lands are located in the lower areas, have been unable to complete grain seeding. The farming area in the Harvey district is seriously affected as result of wet weather, many farmers having been forced to discontinue the planting of grain.

At the Experimental Station here, 14 acres of the area devoted to grain production have not yet been seedcused \$1.00 and received 25 cents ed. Mr. Bailey said seeding has been change. The bottle was turned definitely cancelled insofar as 10 acres are concerned, the remaining four will be seeded for root crops. Situation Acute

situation is described as 'acute" in certain sections of the district, while in other sections where the land is higher, it is not regarded as being so serious. It is generally believed by farmers that the production of grain will be seriously affected, although favorable weather in the early fall will substract from the present seriousness

Although the grain crops are suffering as result of the wet weather, other crops are expected to be successful. There is every indication that this season's potato production will be a normal one, it was pointed out this morning. The hay crop particularly in sections where winter killing was severe, is not expect ed to be as heavy as usual.

The quantity of grain produced in W. K. ## R.C.M.P. SUPT **URGES PUBLIC CO-OPERATION**

Campaign For Safe Driving Well Underway

The province-wide campaign sponsored by the Provincial Government to promote safe driving is well underway, and officers of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police are carrying on a determined drive to rigidly enforce the Motor Vehicle Act. Major W. V. Bruce, superintendent, "J" Division, Royal Canadian Mounted Police, stated this morning that road patrols are busy in all sections of New Brunswick in connection with the "safe driving" program.

The importance of public co-opera on was urged by the police superin endent, who pointed out that the efforts of the police would be greatly assisted if the motoring public would observe driving regulations. As was pointed out on previous occasions by Major Bruce, the public support of the campaign would greatly minimize highway accidents. "A minute saved might result in loss

of life," the superintendent pointed out, adding that many motorists drive madly to reach a destination and arriving there they do not know what to do with the few minutes saved. Police patrols on the main highways carefully check vehicles for merhanical deficiencies and also ascertain if the drivers are carrying the authorized permits. The police are not anxious to prosecute motorists but, under reasonable circumstances, all offenders are being prosecuted.
