

NO INTERVENTION IN SPANISH WAR SAY GREAT EUROPEAN POWERS

Upper St. John Valley Residents Want Better Electric Power Service

New Brunswick Power Commission and State of Maine Authorities Get Together Meeting Held at Woodstock

Effort Will Be Made to Have Maine Corporation Give Up Its Holdings in New Brunswick

(Special to The Daily Mail) WOODSTOCK, June 16—An important meeting between representatives of the New Brunswick Electric Power Commission and the Maine Public Utilities Corporation will be held with a view of finding out if the latter body will give up its holdings in New Brunswick.

The commission has had the electrical problems of the upper Saint John river valley under consideration for several months, and recently published a report dealing with a survey of the area.

F. O. Creighton told the commission that little relief from existing conditions appeared possible under the present set-up of the distributing companies.

It has been argued, Mr. Creighton said, that the load used was too low to justify a cheap rate, but under the existing conditions there was no opportunity.

CANADA WILL REDUCE DEFICIT IS FORECAST

Our Revenues Increased Thirty-Six Millions During First Quarter of Year

OTTAWA, June 16—There appears to be a good chance that the national deficit in the current fiscal year will be reduced to the proportions of the deficit of the Canadian National Railways, whatever that is.

Any forecasts that were made in the last budget speech are proving to be justified as the fiscal year approaches the end of the first quarter.

HISTORY NOT CORRECT IN SCHOOL BOOKS

REGINA, Sask., June 16—Versions of the reformation as contained in Saskatchewan history texts came under fire of Anglican clergymen in session here of the Synod of Qu'Appelle of the Church of England in Canada.

Historians in use contained the fallacy that Henry VIII founded the Church of England one clerical delegate to the Synod declared, after a report on church history in the schools had been read.

A lay delegate declared the necessary corrections should be made in such texts which "were known to be false."

W. B. Green, Moose Jaw delegate commented, amid shouts of "Here, Here," that children should be taught that the church existed from time immemorial and was in England long before the time of St. Augustine.

CHURCH UNION ADVOCATE DIES IN NOVA SCOTIA

HALIFAX, June 16—Rev. A. D. Morton, D.D., one of the premier advocates of church union in Eastern Canada, died here today.

Always active in affairs concerning Mount Allison University at Sackville of which he was one of the oldest living graduates, Dr. Morton was a governor of the institution, and also served on the board of regents.

He is survived by his wife, formerly Elizabeth Pallen, of Chatham, N. B.; two sons, Dr. C. S. Morton of Halifax and Arthur C. Morton of Montreal, and two daughters, Mrs. W. F. Talbot-Crosbie, Kenora, Ont., and Mrs. A. J. Dove, Toronto.

PHILIP SNOWDEN'S ASHES SCATTERED OVER THE MOOR

ICKORNSHAW, June 16—In lashing rain and biting wind, thousands of people made a black circle on the bleak moorland slope here to see Philip Snowden, Viscount Snowden of Ickornshaw, come to his home for the last time.

The little stone cottage in which Britain's Iron Chancellor was born was just hidden from view by the rise of the hill on which he had loved to play in his boyhood.

From Cowling and other scattered villages and hamlets came people to whom Viscount Snowden had always been Philip.

For nearly an hour before the ceremony they had been standing patiently in the drenching rain, some of them carrying pathetic looking bundles of flowers.

In the forefront of the little assembly sat Lady Snowden, pale and sad. Before her in an oaken casket adorned with a simple bunch of narcissi were the ashes of her husband. Many people in the gathering were in tears when the dust was eventually scattered to the winds by Tom Snowden, boyhood friend and distant relative of the viscount.
