that the subway would be an excellent addition to the facilities of the city, and that the city would have acted unwisely not to have accepted the terms of the agreement as advanced by the board of railway commissioners.

Citizens generally will favor the action of the city in accepting the proposition submitted by the railway. The construction of the new subway will eliminate a dangerous level crossing. The crossing, situated as it is at the intersection of three streets creates a dangerous accident hazard. The new structure would also add to the general improvement of that section of the street and would be a decided asset.

Now that the order has been issued by the railway board, approving the construction of the subway, work will likely be commenced in the near future. It is expected that tunnelling work will be completed in a few weeks. The entire project should be completed by August.

There has been considerable speculation as to what difference will be made in the grade on the approach at the George and Charlotte Streets crossings. It was explained by Ald. McCaughey that the new grade on George street will not be any higher outcome of the conference was most

He expressed the view demands were not fully met with, the than the present grade at the intersection of University Avenue and Waterloo Row, and that the Charlotte street grade will be a gradual one, not being more than three feet in height at its highest point.
