

New York Yankees End Losing Streak by Blanking White Sox 7-0

Monte Pearson's One-Hit Hurling Paves Way For Decisive Victory

NEW YORK, May 10—Backing up Monte Pearson's one-hit pitching with a barrage that included three homers, New York Yankees ended their four-game losing streak today by shutting out the White Sox 7-0 in Chicago.

A pair of four-baggers by Joe Di Maggio his first of the season, and another homer by George Selkirk, the Huntsville hitter, led the 10-hit attack on Ted Lyons and Italo Chelini. Pearson, who scored his third straight victory, helped himself to three hits and drove in two runs. Bill Dickey, his battery mate, was forced out in the fifth after being hit on the arm by a pitched ball.

In Cleveland, the Indians won their fifth straight game behind Earl Whitehill and Joe Heving, topping Boston Red Sox 6-5 in 11 innings. The victory kept Cleveland in a first-place tie with Philadelphia, which defeated Detroit.

Manager Joe Cronin's wild throw in the 11th let Earl Averill in with the winning score.

Whitehill struck out 10 Red Sox in 8 1-3 innings he pitched. Hal Trosky hit his second home run of the season.

Washington scored three runs in the ninth inning to keep rookie Julio Bonetti of the Browns from a shut-out but lost the game to St. Louis, 6-3.

For eight innings Bonetti allowed two hits, but he weakened in the final stanza.

Bill Werber smashed out a double with the bases filled in the second inning. Al Dean duplicated the feat in the fourth inning and when the day's barrage was over, Philadelphia had beaten the Tigers, 9-5 in Detroit.

Twenty-two teams have registered so far for the Community Y Soft Ball League. You no doubt will recall Babe Ruth knocking the ball out of the park. Southpaw Fritz Coumbe into the minors, and Lee Fohl out of a job.

Alva Bradley ankled into the visitors' clubhouse at Yankee stadium to inform his noble athletes that the owners only hired the manager, that the public fired him, and that if they wanted Roger Peckinpaugh retained they had to snap out of it pronto and without marking time. They failed to get going, but Peckinpaugh did.

According to the Cleveland baseball scribe the Indians' situation is in a deplorable state. He advises O'Neill to "get mad and stay mad," and suggests such severe penalties as:

1—Letting the players know that any time one of them falls asleep on the field, he is to be awakened to get a tongue-lashing in front of his mates that will keep him awake all night.

2—Players be made to go to bed earlier, so that they can remain awake in the day time.

3—No poker.

If this programme fails, Owner Bradley will have only one alternative. He'll have to make the baseball writer manager.

MARITIME COLLEGE MEET ENTRIES CLOSE ON MAY 17

SAINT JOHN, May 11—Entries for the Maritime intercollegiate track and field meet to be held here Saturday, May 22, will close next Monday, it was announced last night by the executive of the Saint John Olympic Club, sponsor of the meet.

J. Harold Chown, secretary of the club, has notified all Maritime universities that they be especially prompt in filling their entries so that there will be plenty of time to arrange for the program of events.

The local club has already received word from the Mount Allison University team that they will arrive in Saint John May 19 in order to hold several workouts on the K-Club track where the meet will be staged. Tom Trenholm, coach of the Mounties, hopes to familiarize his athletes with the local track so that they will make the best possible showing. It is likely Trenholme will remain here after the meet and take up his duties as Saint John track and field coach for the summer.

The executive arranged for listing of the events which will be run off according to the rules of the Amateur Athletic Union of Canada. The list of events and the order in which they will be run is as follows: 100-yard dash, discus, 880-yard run, high jump, 220-yard dash, hammer throw, hop, step and jump, mile relay, hurdles, pole vault, mile run, broad jump 440-yard dash, shot put and javelin.

Unlike intercollegiate meets of former years all events will be run off in the afternoon so that sport fans will be able to see the entire meet. Officials and timers will be named this week, it is thought.

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
