throughout the entire year, instead of merely in the holiday season. In the evening he spoke on "The Face of Jesus." No portraits of Our Lord are extant, he said, and a great many representations have been made of Jesus throughout the ages by artists. Nevertheless, he stated, although varied in feature, all these portraits had a likeness in the character portrayed.

"Remember God in New Year"

"Weighed in the Balance of True Character" was the subject of the morning sermon of Rev. David L. Kennedy of the Devon Baptist Church delivered before a large congregation Sunday morning. The regular meeting of the Sunday School was held and the Brotherhood was addressed by Burton Lawrence. In the evening Rev. Mr. Kennedy spoke of approaching the New Year with a consciousness of God with an ear inclined to His Voice, and with the willing spirit to execute His will.

Christmas services both morning and evening were held at the Wilmot United Church yesterday under the direction of Rev. Dr. J. W. Bartlett. In the morning the junior choir sang music appropriate to the holiday season. Dr. Bartlett spoke on "A Strange Christmas Basket." In the evening the regular choir sang, Dr. Bartlett giving a Christmas-book sermon on Lloyd Douglas' new book, "Home for Christmas."

Rev. John Linton who conducted both services at the George Street Baptist Church Sunday, spoke in the morning on "The Aftermath of Christmas." The church choir rendered special Christmas music. The regular session of the Sunday School was held in the afternoon.

Fight Causes of War

In his evening sermon on "Peace Today," Rev. Mr. Linton pointed out that the angels said "Peace be on earth among men of good-will." Today, however, peace is not with us. He stressed the point that the warfare of the church is a battle against the causes of war in order that the song of the Angels might be realized.

The annual Sunday School Christmas tree and entertainment will be held this evening in the vestry of the George Street Baptist Church at eight o'clock, Rev. Mr. Linton said. The story of the coming of the Child Christ was the sermon delivered at the Brunswick Street Baptist Church Sunday morning by Rev. Dr. N. A. McNeill of Sussex. Sunday School was held in the afternoon. In the evening a Christmas musical service was rendered by the church choir, the cantata "Holy Night."

St. Anne's Parish Church celebrated the occasion of Christmas in the regular services on Sunday, as well as in a special service held Saturday morning. Musical services were featured at the church on both days, a carol service being held last evening. Ven. Archdeacon S. C. Gray officiated, with the musical part of the services under the direction of Miss Hilda E. Shorten.

A Christmas service was held at the Gibson Memorial United Church, Devon, on Saturday morning, with Rev. W. A. Burge officiating, his theme being "Christmas in the Fullness of Heart." Sunday the services were of the nature of New Year's services. In the morning, Rev. Mr. Burge spoke on "Turning Over a New Leaf," while in the evening, his subject was "Retrospect and Looking Forward."
