PROPECTS GOOD  
FOR SUCCESSFUL  
HAY CROP IN 1937Weather Contributes To  
Growth--Crops Are  
Progressing

The 1937 hay crop in New Brunswick holds promise of being one of the most successful in several years, according to officials of the crops division of the provincial department of agriculture this morning. There is a noticeable absence of clover but from a quantitative point of view this season's production will exceed last year's record. There is a keen demand for timothy hay and according to all indications the demand will be well supplied this year.

The fine growing weather that the various crops have experienced during the summer has been the best incentive for fast growth this year. Insufficient snow allowed frost to penetrate the ground, although the spring showers were beneficial to some extent.

In some sections of the province the farmers have been cutting hay for over a week, in others they have only started. The hay-cutting season particularly in marshland areas, will not be concluded until the middle of September, it was said.

The Tantramar marshes in the Sackville area constitute the largest producing area. The territory which includes 40,000 acres produced thousands of tons of hay. The annual hay production on the marsh areas in Westmorland and Albert counties is approximately 100,000 tons.

Good Progress Hay operations are progressing splendidly in all parts of the province although cutting started a little later than usual. Most of the farmers started last week. After a late start the crops generally have been coming along fast, even remarkably fast in certain sections. The warm weather is the main reason while the great humidity of the past few weeks has also helped.

## WHEAT

(Continued from Page One) the board bought 70 wheat, and its activities were confined to disposing of the large surplus the board had bought in previous years. Dr. Murray was able to inform the committee today this surplus was almost wiped out.

The Board could have sold all the wheat it held had it so desired, but it was considered better policy to hold some against any eventualities which may develop in the coming crop year, which opens Aug. 1.

The Government will have to decide whether it will declare a minimum price for the next crop year. A suggestion has come from the West that the Government fix a minimum price at \$1 a bushel. Cash wheat in Winnipeg today closed at 1.4¢ 1-8 for No. 1 Northern.

It has been urged that the Board should give the farmers the opportunity to sell to it at \$1, this being only the initial payment, and subsequent payments be made for the amount the Board actually gets for the wheat. The pools used to operate in that manner. In this way the grower would share the advantage should the market go up after he sold his crop.

However, the impression here seems to be the Board will be instructed by the Government not to buy wheat, particularly while prices are around the present level. It may even stick to the policy of last year and keep out of the market unless it breaks below 90 cents. This would probably mean the Board would buy no wheat again during the next crop year, and would not have much left to sell.

"I was immeasurably astonished," said Prof. Ziegler in opening the exhibit of "degenerate" art, "to find that some of these documents of a decadent art which has been brought here to Munich were still being exhibited until a few days ago in the public galleries and museums."

"The products shown here are only a part of those still on hand in these institutions. Whole railroad trains would not have been enough to clear this rubbish out of the German museums. This has yet to be done and will be done very shortly."

"All in all, one can say that everything that is holy to a decent German necessarily had to be trampled in mud here."

Palestine itself, where a renewal of sanguinary strife is looked for daily, is seriously weakened by domestic opposition.

Laborites and Liberals are attacking the Royal Commission's report in the House of Commons today along the general line that a tripartite division of Palestine into Jewish and Arab States and a mandated corridor would be at best a desperate expedient capable of incubating war.

Possibly it would be justifiable if it were acceptable to both Jews and Arabs, they hold, but both races vehemently assailed the proposal as a betrayal of British pledges and as a grave injury to their racial, political and economic interests and rights.

It is believed that this could be demonstrated by a parliamentary inquiry, but the Government is strongly opposed to further discussions of the broad principles promulgated by Lord Peel and his colleagues after a lengthy study of the situation.
