

Examination of applicants has aleady been begun at Saint John by Dr. Hughes, two certificates stating fact of blindness having been re ceived at the office of the Board this morning. Of the more than 400 applications received, pensions have been granted in nine cases so far, Mr. Jones said. It was possible to grant these without the medical examination because of the fact that they are among the fifteen blind applicants in N. B., who had certificates of blindness on record at the Department of Pensions and Natlich al Health at Ottawa, which certificates were trans ferred to the office of the N. B. Board at the request of Mr. Jones.

"We have already taken steps to arrange for the examinations to take place, and applicants will be advised as to the dates and places of the examinations," said Mr. Jones. "It is quite apparent," he added, "that the dates must be fixed for the different examinations, since it would be impossible for the physicians to handle the whole number of appli-
