On the play there seemed little difference in the teams and both Oliff Young, in the Capital cage, and 'Buz' Barton, Maroon janitor, turned in exceptional displays.

Fritz, 27, took Canadian boys' titles in 1921, 1922 and 1923 and in 1930 captured the Catholic Inter-school meet from a field of 189. Recently he established a new cross-country record, travelling 60 miles with a 50pound pack in 12 hours 15 minutes. Fritz won his first title at school when he was 10.

Pierre, 21, the youngest of the three, won the cross country championships of St. Therese, Que., for seven consecutive years, and is regarded as one of the leading professional skiers in the Dominion.

The Prevosts are expected in New York soon for the competition on the 125-foot tower which is nearing completion. In 1935, Jerry, who is slight of build, jumped 134 and 132 feet on Cote des Neiges Hill on Mt. Royal. He won this important event last year with a 131-foot leap.




