YANKEE STADIUM, New York Oct. 7-The world champion Yankees today exploded the last thin vestiges of the myth that they can be beaten by good left-handed pitching.

Simultaneously and by the characteristic strategy of the booming base hit they shellacked New York Giants for the second straight day by the same score, 8-1, and moved majestically in the direction of their second straight world series conquest at the expense of their neighboring rivals.
