Good and Bad Temptations

The Urge for Evil and the Urge for Good Are Forces in Fredericton

In the course of his sermon on "Temptations in Fredericton," delivered at the Wilnot Church last evening Rev. J. W. Bartlett, the pastor referred to the drinking in the community, the evils of the public dance hall brought into disrepute by drunkenness and the drunkenness is not confined to one sex, the increase of drunkenness amongst women and the evils that exist in connection with the automobile. He referred to the slickers who drive up to the curbs and induce young women—many of whom are strangers to the community and the city ways—to go on lonely drives by car. Mr. Bartlett pointed out that temptation is of two kinds. There is the urge of evil and there is the urge of good. These two forces are at work in Fredericton as elsewhere.

First there is the temptation of evil. It takes many forms. There is the gross passions of the flesh. The automobile has been used as the devil's ally. Young women should be on their guard. Everything seems to be on wheels including bawdiness and adultery.

One is disconcerted by the reports of drinking in this community. Womanhood is in moral jeopardy. Continuing, Mr. Bartlett said, "Various things are menacing the institution of the Sunday. In many cases the hours of Sunday are spent at the poker table and this is a poor preparation for life." Mr. Bartlett scored organization sport carried on on the Sabbath day and stated that if the people of influence in the community were more careful of their example it would be easier to safeguard our youth. Any way the secularization of Sunday is creating a poor atmosphere in which to bring up a family.

These dives of iniquity are being frequented by mothers and matrons. A fine example to set for their daughters! How do mothers expect the coming generation to be different with this example before them?

Many movies are excellent, but others are highly detrimental, especially to children. Why don't people boycott the bad, and thus put a stop to them?

Fredericton is a city of homes. Has the Bible as much chance in them as the comic strips and the sales catalogues?

Young people come to our city from all over the Province and beyond. They find themselves in a different intellectual atmosphere, and many of the old beliefs may be called in question. How that adjustment is made is a matter of first importance.

SETTLER FLOW FROM BRITAIN IS FORECAST

LONDON, Jan. 25—Hope that emigration from the United Kingdom to the Dominions would be resumed in the not far distant future was expressed by Malcolm MacDonald, Secretary of State for the Dominions, as he introduced an emigration resolution in the House of Commons.

The Home approved without division the resolution which would enable the Government in certain cases to contribute 75 per cent. of the cost of any migration plan against 50 per cent. at present. This was a preliminary step to extension for fifteen years at the Empire Settlement Act of 1922 which expires on May 31 next.

The resolution would also limit the amount the Government may spend on migration schemes to \$7,500,000 annually, or half the amount that could be spent at present. In explanation MacDonald said that expenditure in the peak migration year of 1927 was \$6,410,000.

Beverly Baxter, Toronto-born Conservative, criticized the decrease in the sum allotted to assist migration. He recalled the recent assertion by Rt. Hon. R. B. Bennett, former Prime Minister of Canada, that migration was the most urgent need of the Empire.

Alarming Tuberculosis Situation North Shore

BATHURST, Jan. 25—Dr. J. E. Paulin, district medical officer in the county of Gloucester, in making a report before the annual session of the Gloucester County Council on Saturday stated that he had found conditions alarming in the tuberculosis situation in the Tracadie section.

A resolution was passed dividing the county into three districts or zones and requesting the provincial health department to place three public health nurses in the county.

Another resolution adopted, to the effect that Gloucester was unable to pay for tuberculosis patients, requested the provincial government to assume the liability.

BRITISH SOCIETY IS PURGING ITS LISTS OF UNDESIRABLES FOR THE ROYAL FUNCTIONS

Guilty Divorcees and Boisterous Guests of Cocktail Parties Will Be Eliminated.

LONDON, Jan. 25—A clean-up of British society has begun as a result of Edward VIII's abdication. West end circles have reported.

Hostesses of the type criticized by the Archbishop of Canterbury will be omitted from guests at royal functions this year, it was said.

Buckingham palace officials are reported to be carefully "editing" invitation lists whence come the names of guests for the royal garden parties, banquets and the royal enclosure at Ascot.

Guilty parties in divorce actions are to be barred from any of these functions, as will debutantes who have been conspicuously boisterous at cocktail parties.

Is Communism Here?

THE DAILY MAIL is not yet in a position to vouch for the report that is persistently circulated to the effect that Communism has made an entering wedge into certain of our educational institutions in this Province, and that certain organizations connected with some of these institutions are being fostered and encouraged by people from the Upper Provinces, including Toronto, who are Communistic agents. The Daily Mail hopes within the next few days either to be able to refute this report or give the public the particulars, naming the institutions and the organizations connected with these institutions. We do not think it advisable to be more definite at the present time. But we intend to be definite as soon as the proofs are forthcoming. If the institutions which are kept up by the people of this Province are, as is alleged, hotbeds of Communism and are in fact becoming schools of Communism, the sooner the people of this Province who are paying the bills to keep these institutions running are made to know these things the better.

The people of Canada and of the Province of New Brunswick should be aware that Communistic influence, propaganda and doctrine are stronger right here in Canada today than in any other country in North America outside of Mexico. There is no need for the people of this part of the Dominion feeling a false sense of security and saying that Communism can never get a foothold amongst us. Let us not be deceived in the matter. If what we hear is true, Communism has already got its entering wedge into some of our nearby educational institutions.

The Communist works in a very insidious and subtle manner, entrapping those who fall for its teachings almost before they are aware of the danger.

More than ever before men and women are today asking this question. Today we will endeavor to give the answer to this question.

"Communism is a materialistic philosophy of life which advocates the establishment of a dictatorship of the people in all countries of the world, to be brought about by violent revolution or by any means deemed necessary, in order to ultimately arrive at and preserve a classless society in which there shall be no private ownership and in which all property shall be vested in the community as a whole, and all labor and human activities organized for the common benefit by a centralized group of workers' representatives. There you have in one sentence all the essentials of Russian Communism.

Communism teaches that only matter exists, consequently man is devoid of soul and there is no spiritual Being such as God, denying therefore the existence of God and denying a soul in man, necessarily eliminates religion, for religion is the relationship of the soul to God. Man being essentially material, that is, devoid of soul, he is subject to the necessary laws of nature, just as plants, animals, etc. In other words, all man's activities are necessitated and determined by laws as inexorable as the law of gravitation, and since man is in a constant state of change, it teaches that all history is a history of materialistic evolution. All human activities, therefore, such as marriage, political, religious, and social, are determined by and moulded by economic forces or class struggles. By its teachings human society has been reduced to two classes, viz: employer and employee, or capitalist and labor, and even the smallest shopkeeper is regarded as a capitalist. By violence workers are admonished to overthrow the capitalist system, and by the laws of materialistic evolution bring into existence a classless society.

The three main elements in the system advocated by Communists are: The denial of God and the suppression of religion; the abolition of all private property; the stirring up of hatred and enmity between the different classes of society, urging the poor to despise the rich.

Nicholas Lenin, the father of present day Communism, defines it as nothing less than power based upon force, and limited by nothing, by no kind of law and by absolutely no rule.

Schools and colleges teaching these doctrines are operated in parts of Upper Canada and the Western Provinces, training students in their practice, for the sole object of some day putting them into effect after they have destroyed our present system by violence, revolution or civil war.

In every country today Communists are using all means deemed necessary to destroy all forms of existing government. They are trying to get the working men and women, together with the boys and girls, to join them to bring about such destruction. They hold out all manner of impossible things that sound good, but in reality are only deceitful promises, to allure the people. In other words, they are trying to stir up a world revolution. Books, newspapers, pamphlets, besides the schools and colleges, are being used for this wicked purpose. Men and women, boys and girl, be on your guard! PROFESSORS DEFEND SPEECH OF CANADIANS

GENEVA, Jan. 25—The two committees which were most active in Geneva today are those which conferred in regard to the situation in Danzig and Alexandretta. It was agreed that in Danzig the first High Commissioner should be maintained. The Polish report on raw materials is being discussed and United States and Japan have agreed to co-operate.

QUEBEC, Jan. 25—S. J. Hungerford, chairman and president of the Canadian National Railways joined with other officers and with employees of the Quebec District here tonight in paying tribute to a notable record of service at a dinner given in honor of Harvey W. Sharpe, superintendent of motive power and car equipment for the district who is retiring after 54 years of continuous service with the Canadian National and predecessor companies. Not many men were privileged to pursue their chosen work for half a century said Mr. Hungerford, and still fewer maintained their identification continuously with same interests. WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 25—All the resources of the United States Federal Government have been placed at the disposal of the people in the flooded areas. Troops, boats, all equipments and tents will be made available in affording relief to the sufferers. It is reported that the main streets of Cincinnati are covered with twenty feet of water and that half a million people in the Ohio valley are homeless. One of the greatest fears of public authorities is the breaking out of an epidemic of typhoid and disorder resulting from looting.

CINCINNATI, Jan. 25—The city of Pittsburgh is again threatened by floods. President Roosevelt has ordered the army to enter the districts afflicted by floods and fires and help the Red Cross in bringing relief to the hundreds of thousands of homeless people in this, the greatest flood, and the one which is becoming fast the greatest menace to the health of the United States.

A fire which swept over a three-mile front adding to the horror and suffering of the 900-mile flood disaster in the Ohio River valley while the waters continued to rise was brought under control yesterday by the fire department.

Oil-fed flames over eight storeys high floated on the flood waters. At one time at least 32 buildings were burning, Fire Chief Houston reported.

Early last night the Cincinnati fire prevention bureau said the conflagration had been brought under control. A section of the Mill Creek district more than three miles long and half a mile deep was affected.

Flood damage in Cincinnati alone had been estimated previously by Meteorologist W. C. Devereaux at \$5,000,000.

At least 15 firemen were injured. The flood was still rising and

Restoration of Capitalism with German-Japanese Aid Said Planned By Seventeen Russian Plotters

GERMANY, ITALY WAITING REPLY FROM BRITAIN

LONDON, Jan. 25—The non-intervention committee from Germany and Italy have agreed that all countries are to recall all volunteers from Spain whether they are political or military agitators. The reply is awaited in regard to this from Great Britain.

TOKYO, Jan. 25—The Japanese army has issued a declaration that no general is to be a Cabinet Minister. The Emperor has commanded that a new government be formed.

Hoped to Regain Territories After Eventual Estrangement From Both Countries.

MOSCOW, Jan. 25—A strange tale of international intrigue in which the exiled Leon Trotsky was accused of seeking the military aid of Germany Poland and Japan to overthrow the Soviet Government, was told today, at the trial of 17 former government officials, all prominent.

The defendants, accused of aiding Trotsky's plotting, all pleaded guilty and apparently were headed for the firing squad.

The many allegations included a plan to give Sakhalin Island to Japan for its oil supplies in event of war with the United States, and to aid Germany's conquest of the Danube countries and the Balkans.

FLU RAGES UNABATED IN THE WEST

WINNIPEG, Jan. 25—An epidemic of influenza continued unchecked in Western Canada last night, concentrated chiefly in North Alberta and the Pacific Coast. A number of deaths were reported. Six additional schools closed in the area around Edmonton as the disease sent that city's health officer, Dr. R. B. Jenkins, to bed.

Nearly sixty school teachers and 3,200 pupils were ill in Vancouver, all suffering from "flu." Several deaths have occurred.

The situation remained unchanged in Saskatoon and other North Saskatchewan centres where hundreds have been stricken in the past fortnight.
