The Lenton Season will start this year on Feb. 10, which will be an earlier date than for some years. Easter Sunday will be on March 28.

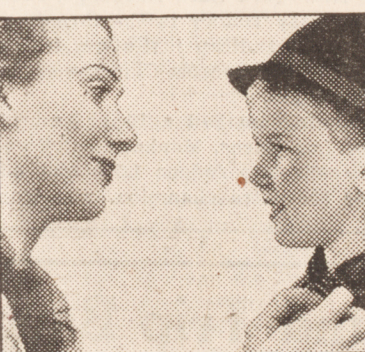
SAY WOMEN AND CHILDREN
