One of the features was a tent containing collapsible chairs, in which the visitors sat while listening to the speeches and watching the demonstrations.

This afternoon a meeting was held at Carrieburg, York County. The same speakers were present, with the exception that Mr. Gilbert was replaced by Raymond Wetmore, provincial agricultural representative for York County. This afternoon's meeting brought to a close the series which has been underway for the past three weeks.

The purpose of the meetings, explained Mr. Bailey, is to show the stations in the sections in which the stations are located the nature of the work being done at the stations, and the results which have been secured by the station officials through the use of various treatments, such as soil and fertilizer treatments. The farmers are then urged to adopt the methods which have proven satisfactory in the station experiments.

FISHING ON THE MIRAMICHI IMPROVING

Clearwater is Teeming With Salmon, Grilse, Trout, State American Anglers.

Although angling conditions on the Southwest Miramichi during the past fortnight have been considerably below par, three American sportsmen who made the canoe trip from Half Moon Cove to Boiestown under the guidance of Willis Norrad, manager of the Kenmore camps, spent a very pleasant week, which was featured by a good catch of salmon, grilse and trout. The party was composed of H. B. VanClue, Montclair, N.J.; R. Harrison, Verona, N.J.; and Chester Allen, Warren, Penn.

Mr. VanClue's catch consisted of eight grilse and several nice sea trout; Mr. Harrison landed four salmon, eight grilse and a number of trout; and Mr. Allen tallied up two salmon, twelve grilse and twenty trout, one of the speckled beauties tipping the scales at two and a half pounds. The visitors, besides fishing the main river, devoted some attention to Clearwater Stream, an important tributary, and found it teeming with salmon, grilse and sea trout but they were in a state of lethargy because of weather and water conditions and could not be persuaded to rise to a fly.

Mr. Norrad, who was a visitor to the city today, says that angling conditions on the Miramichi are improving, and that guides and outfitters have a number of non-resident parties booked and are hopeful that September will prove to be the best month of the season.

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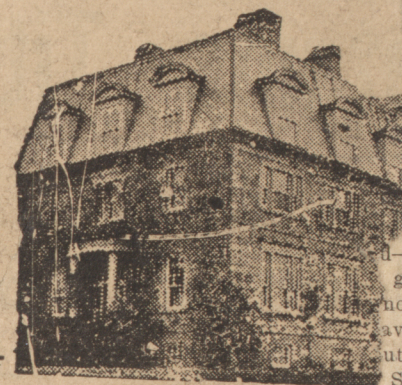
