Inland Revenue Departments at the latter city.

The credit union, established on its present footing in New Brunswick by the Dysart government, is described in the Credit Union Societies' Act, 1936, as "a society incorporated for the twofold purpose of promoting thrift among its members and creating a source of credit for its members at legitimate rates of interest for provident and productive purposes." To these two purposes there might well be added a third, that of training the members of the union in business methods in the handling of their own money, and the principles and advantages of co-operative endeavor.

### Weekly Saving Feature

A co-operative organization, the credit union is formed of men and women who seek to promote their welfare by thriftiness and the pooling of their resources for credit purposes. Regular, periodic saving is encouraged among the members by having them deposit small sums periodically usually 25 cents per week. The deposit of larger sums at irregular periods is not encouraged, for the primary purpose of the societies is to serve the common people, who are deprived of many of the ordinary comforts of life, and who are willing to save small sums, although at a sacrifice, to assist in community endeavor.

The first credit union formed under the 1936 Act was organized at Blackville in September, 1936, and boasted 13 pioneer members. Since the success of this union, the popularity of the idea has increased by leaps and bounds throughout the province, especially in the rural areas, where the benefits conferred by such organization are more greatly needed.

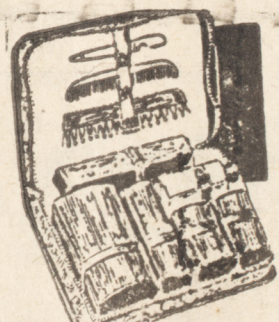
