The trees will however, be weakened to such an extent that another similar attack next year would probably kill them. It would take from fifty to one hundred years to replace the trees and in the meantime Fredericton would resemble a place that had

Fredericton has for years been noted for its elm shaded streets. The fame of these elms has been spread in song and in story. The trees of Fredericton are its greatest asset and have induced not only hundreds of tourists to visit our city, but have induced many families to take up their residence in the capital city of the province.

IF FREDERICTON SHOULD LOSE ITS TREES AS MIGHT BE POSSIBLE IT WOULD LOOK LIKE A DESERTED MINING

Fredericton today is visited by a pest called the canker worm, which is stripping the trees of its foliage. In some portions of the city, principally on Waterloo Row and about the Cathedral grounds the trees are practically bare. The streets and houses and certain portions of the city are covered with canker worms.

According to authorities connected with the Dominion Entomological Laboratory, these worms will go away within a week or two and whilst they may not injure the trees to a great extent this year, their return visits will so weaken the trees that they eventually will die. This is a situation which we are facing at the present time. Where the foliage has been destroyed after the leaves were fully developed there will be no more foliage on the trees this year. Where the leaves have not fully grown they may develop after the plague of the canker worm has ceased for this year.

OUR TREES ACCORDING TO THE BEST AUTHORITY CAN-NOT STAND MORE THAN ANOTHER YEAR OF THIS PLAGUE WIHTOUT BEING KILLED. People connected with the Entomological Department have year after year notified the city authorities of the seriousness of this canker worm attacking the trees. Mr. Balch of the department has for some years done his best to warn the citizens that unless something was done before it was too late that Fredericton was in a fair way to lose its shade trees. It is figured that it would take from fifty to one hundred years to replace Fredericton's shade trees should the latter be destroyed.

DIFFERENT CITY COUNCILS HAVE REMAINED INACTIVE IN REGARD TO THE TREES. WHAT IS THE PRESENT CITY COUNCIL GOING TO DO TO REMEDY THE SITUATION AND TO PROTECT ONE OF FREDERICTON'S CHIEF ASSETS-THE

It is stated by those in a position to know that the principal way to control the canker worm situation is to use a sprayer. This sprayer would cost between two and three thousand dollars, but it would be money well spent. IT MIGHT BE WELL FOR THE PRO-VINCIAL GOVERNMENT TO CONSIDER THE MATTER OF PURCHASING THE SPRAYER NOT ONLY FOR USE IN THIS CITY BUT FOR THER PLACES THROUGHOUT THE PROVINCE WHERE IT IS NEEDED. It is not so long ago since hundreds of shade trees in the city of Moncton were destroyed and had to be cut down, whereas they could have been saved if the sprayer had been used in time. As it would cost in the vicinity of twenty-five dollars each to remove the dead trees it is easy to figure out where a sprayer would pay for itself in this respect alone. Another scheme that has been tried out by some local citizens including some officials of the Entomological station has been the banding of the trees in certain sections. This is a matter however that has to be done properly and the Entomological department informed The Daily Mail that whenever any parties are ready to have their trees banded that that department will be glad to supply an expert to see that the banding is properly done.

If Fredericton loses its shade trees which have made it known all over Canada we shall have no person but ourselves to blame. These trees will be lost entirely through our own carelessnesss and through a carelessness that is almost criminal. NOW IS THE TIME TO WAKE UP. WHEAT PROBE TO GO ABROAD, SAYS CAN. JUDGE

Hearings in Britain and Europe Likely, Says Mr. Justice Turgeon

OTTAWA, June 7-To study the marketing of Canadian grain from the buyer's point of view, sessions of the Royal Grain Commission will probably be held in Great Britain and Europe, Mr. Justice W. F. A. Turgeon, the Commissioner, announced here recently.

"It is not absolutely definite," he said, "but I believe we will go."

The Commission adjourned at Regina Friday night after hearing evidence in six cities on various phases of marketing the Canadian crop. Judge Turgeon then came to Ottawa, where he and those assisting him are studying the volume of material collected in the 71 days of sittings.

"We will likely go overseas," he stated, "because that is where the markets are.

"Plans were too indefinite," he added, to suggest any details of the places he will visit or the exact nature of the information to be sought. It is understood Judge Turgeon;


