

DEVON--MARYSVILLE TEAMS OPEN YORK--SUNBURY CIRCUIT TONIGHT

Records Smashed at Interscholastic Meet

Saint John Trackmen Lead Field -- R.C.S. Close Second

SAINT JOHN, June 7.—Six combined, interscholastic and provincial association records were smashed and one association record equalled on Saturday at the K-Club recreational centre when the Saint John High School track and field athletes annexed the provincial association championship in a classy field representing athletes from nine New Brunswick high schools.

With a total of 38 points the Saint John High representatives topped their old rivals, Rothesay Collegiate School, who finished in second place with 29 points. With three events to go the standing was Rothesay 23, Saint John High 21. But High annexed 17 points in the three to give them the championship by a comfortable margin.

D. Smith of Harvey Station, N. B., Mount Allison Academy's lone representative was the individual star of the meet. He won three firsts, taking the 220 yard dash, the broad jump and the 440 yards dash.

In addition he established a new record for the broad jump, breaking both the interscholastic and provincial marks for this event and equaling the provincial association record for the 220-yard dash. He was awarded the cup for high aggregate.

Closely following Smith's spectacular performance F. Peterson of Rothesay Collegiate School was second among the high-point winners with 14. He won the shotput with a distance of 43 feet, one and one-half inches, to break both the interscholastic and provincial association records; won the discus throw; placed second in the hurdles and also ran on the Rothesay Collegiate School one-mile relay team which placed second.

Lawson Double Winner
Lawson of Saint John High was a double winner taking the high jump and hurdles and establishing a new provincial association record of 17 and one-fifth seconds for the latter event. His teammate, Craven, ran a sensational mile in three minutes and 41.45 seconds just one and four-fifths seconds off the record. Markey of Fredericton High was in a class by himself in the pole vault. Hueston of Rothesay Collegiate won the 100 yards with a new provincial association record.

While Saint John High and Rothesay won the largest number of points representatives from Fredericton High, Mount Allison Academy and

Milltown High were serious contenders in every event. The other four schools failed to place in any of the finals.

At the conclusion of the meet the trophies were presented. To D. Smith, Mount Allison Academy the individual aggregate cups awarded for the first time this year was presented by A. C. Smith, M.L.A.; the Walsh Memorial trophy was won by W. Craven of Saint John High and presented by E. J. Henneberry, M.L.A., and the trophy for the team championship was presented by Councillor Barbour to Captain Lison of the Saint John High School squad.

Devon Squad Rated as Favorites --- Record Crowd Expected

The bid will be raised off the baseball season tonight when the Devon troops are at home to the Marysville squad in the initial battle of the campaign. In top-notch form, the Devon brigade is rated as likely winners of the skirmish which has all the earmarks of being a battle-royal. The advance sale of tickets augurs well for a record attendance when the game gets under way on the Devon diamond at 6:30 o'clock.

C. L. Dougherty, president of the league, will toss in the first ball to officially open the 1937 campaign for York-Sunbury baseball honors. Both teams have a powerful array of troops to wheel into action and the cash customers are promised more than their quarters' worth in high-class diamond entertainment.

Coach-Manager "Tanker" Hughes announced last night that he would start "Doc" Aitken on the mound; "Dinny" Dinsmore, former college diamond star, will be held in reserve.

Bailey will be in his old position behind the batter, while Malloy, McLenahan and Deep will guard the bases. 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PRO BALL TEAM SIGNED IN BOSTON

SAINT JOHN, June 5.—Saint John's new professional baseball team was signed yesterday in Boston. This was announced yesterday by Ray Hansen, manager of the new outfit, in a telegram to the backers of the club, Michael Howard and Frank McShane.

In his telegram Ray referred to several players and it is possible that he may get two or three more to sign before he leaves for home.

Who the players were he had signed Ray did not state but he did say that combined they form a strong aggregation with plenty of baseball ability.

In selecting the team Ray had the advice of Eddie Carr, former manager of the Saint John team in the Boston Twilight League several years back, and others. Ray knew Eddie in the days when St. Peter's Club played visiting teams from Boston each week and when he left had definitely decided to get in touch with him.

It was learned yesterday, following the telegram that Carr would act as agent for the Saint John team in booking teams from Boston and other parts of New England States to play the new Saint John pro team here.

Lines Up "Shono's" Team

After the players were signed yesterday morning Ray, through Carr, was introduced to "Shono" Collins, former major league star, who played both the infield and outfield for Chicago White Sox and Boston Red Sox. "Shono" had a bang-up professional team and arrangements were completed for Collins to bring his team here for the opening date on June 9, with a doubleheader for the holiday and possibly a game on Thursday and two more on Saturday.

The Thursday game would be played in the afternoon to give night-workers and business men, who are summering in the country, a chance to witness the brand of ball the new team can produce.

The telegram indicated that Ray had gathered together some of the finest talent available in Boston and its suburbs and that it will give complete satisfaction to the fans.

Daily "Gramp" O'Hara and his crew are getting Shamrock Park in shape and already have completed repairs to the fence and stand and have screened and graded the diamond as well as filled in the holes in the field. The grass has been trimmed and the park is looking in tip-top shape, awaiting the arrival of the new team.

Meanwhile tickets are being sold on the 10-game basis and everything points to a fine season and a return to real, fast baseball.
