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

Miss Hayward Speaks to L.N.S. Group

Miss Constance Hayward of Mon-
ton, Maritime secretary of the Le-
ague of Nations Society work arrived
in the city yesterday and last even-
ing addressed the ladies study group
of the League of Nations Society,
which met at the Y Community Room.
The chair was taken by Dr. F. S.
Toole who explained the aims of
the study group namely the compell-
ing necessity of the members of the
community acquiring an intelligent
knowledge of international affairs.
Miss Hayward who for the past sev-
eral weeks has been in Halifax and
who also visited the principal Mar-
itime centres during the summer gave
some valuable suggestions to the
study group which held its first
meeting last evening. Miss Hayward
told of the successful carrying on of
several of these groups throughout
the Maritimes. If Canada is to have
a proper status among nations she
must also carry a responsibility for
a direction of her policy and this
policy must be established in our
minds. Miss Hayward was pleased to
state that the study groups directing
authorities were receiving full sup-
port from the educational depart-
ments and as well as from schools.
The slogan with many of the powers
was now "Back to the League" which
was looming ahead once more as a
possible solution of the problem of
international peace. The league was
just passing out of a period of dis-
illusionment and was once more con-
sidered of momentous importance.
The study club will meet periodically
and if successful more groups will
be formed. Books will be studied sev-
eral of which were suggested by Miss
Hayward. Miss Hayward will ad-
dress the Y's Men's Club at a supper
meeting at 6.10 o'clock this evening,
when she will speak on the value of
Peace Week.

The second week of the 18th New
Brunswick Egg Laying Contest, con-
ducted at the local Dominion Experi-
mental Station, was concluded on
Nov. 7, with a production of 572 eggs
and 514.8 points. This is an average
production of 40.8%.

The Barred Rocks owned by Wm.
J. White, Moore's Mills led in pro-
duction for the week with 46 eggs
and 47.5 points.

The Barred Rocks owned by C. A.
Shannon, Dorchester, were in second
position for the week with 51 eggs
and 40.6 points.

The New Hampshires owned by
Lloyd McKinney, Gagetown, were in
third position for the week with 37
eggs and 40.5 points.

The Barred Rocks owned by Wm.
J. White, Moore's Mills led the con-
test with 86 eggs and 87.8 points.

The Barred Rocks owned by Lloyd
M. Wood, Harvey Station, are in
second position with 78 eggs and 79.1
points.

The New Hampshires owned by
Lloyd McKinney, Gagetown, are in
third position with 72 eggs and 76.1
points.

The Barred Rock hen No. 9 own-
ed by Lloyd M. Wood, Harvey Station
is the leading hen to date with
13 eggs and 13.7 points.

The Barred Rock hen No. 4 owned
by Wm. J. White, Moore's Mills, is in
second place to date with 11 eggs and
12.7 points.

The Barred Rock hen No. 1 owned
by Arthur L. Graham, Hoyt Station, is
in third place to date with 11 eggs
and 12.1 points.

next defense on carefully prepared
fortified positions along the banks of
the Yellow River on which they have
been working for weeks.

General Chiang-Kai-Shek China's
strong man, said that the battle at
Shanghai was purely a local engage-
ment. He said that China would re-
fuse all efforts at mediation by a
third party and had no intention of
allowing herself to become entangled
with the peculiar ideology of any
one group. This remark was taken to
be an answer to Germany's offer to
mediate on China giving its adher-
ence to the anti-Communist pact.
