## DARK HAired ACTRESS HAS BEST CHANCE

HOLLYWOOD, March 9—Young actresses who are headed for Hollywood and a chance at movie fame can, in these days of makeup miracles, arrive as blondes, brunettes or red-heads regardless of the color of hair that nature gave them.

Their problem is to sense the trend of the times in hair color and to make their choice accordingly.

But that isn't easy. A few years ago the blondes had all the best of it in Hollywood. There were more platinum blondes per block in Hollywood than anywhere else on earth. Now the trend seems to be away from gold and platinum shades toward the darker, more natural color.

Ruth Pursley, pretty feminine hair dresser at the Warner Bros. studios, has figured it out mathematically.

A young actress with better than average acting ability has a 60-40 chance to succeed if she is a brunette or a natural 'dark blonde,' according to Miss Pursley's figures. She is the official hair dresser and personal friend of Joan Blondell and helped Joan to make up her mind to change from 'false blonde' to natural ash blonde a few months ago.

A red-head, provided other things are reasonably in her favor and she has ability, beauty and some experience, can figure that she has a 50-50 chance to succeed in pictures.

The synthetic blondes, that is the platinum and gold headed young ladies, have a handicap at present to overcome, and the odds for them are not more than 30-70.

It is the blondes, Miss Pursley points out, who have the most changing to do. Kay Francis, for instance, who is generally considered one of the most beautiful women in pictures has always worn her natural dark hair on the screen unless the role called for it to grow gray.

Josephine Hutchinson, a natural red-head, has never had to change her hair color either; but Bette Davis who was once very blonde, almost platinum, is now back to her natural state—and likes it. She believes the public will approve of the change when her new picture, 'Marked Women' is released.

Among the young players on the Warner lot, many of whom go to Miss Pursley for advice on how to change their hair coloring, there are two brunettes for every single blonde. Olivia de Havilland and Ruby Keeler are dark. Beverly Roberts, whose next important role so far is in 'God's Country and the Woman,' is an ash blonde. Margaret Lindsay and Ann Sheridan are brunettes and intend to remain that way. Anita Louise keeps up the one-to-two average.

Jane Travis and Carol Hughes are dark. Marie Wilson is still platinum and Veda Ann Borg is a bright red-head. Glenda Farrell is still a blonde at home and on the screen, but Jean Muir has changed to a dark or natural ash blonde shade of hair for her most recent roles.

Altogether Miss Pursley has it figured out that the ambitious young women who are preparing to enter the movies had best leave their hair alone—at least not bleach it gold or platinum.

"The trend," she pronounces, "is toward darker hair in pictures." She believes it is a good sign.

### CORN FLAKES GRADUATE FROM BREAKFAST TABLE

#### Marjorie Mills Explains How Crunchy Golden Morsels Lend Themselves to Preparation of Dishes Other Than Customary Morning Cereal

For 30 years crisp, crunchy, golden corn flakes have been the king of the breakfast table, and have now conquered the banquet board as well.

The most recent of corn flake triumphs is corn flake cookery. The most discriminating hostess has now found that corn flakes are the means to an end in the preparation of many interesting dishes that will lend distinction to her menus and win applause from her family and guests.

Crunchiness, an even golden color and a perfectness of flavor—the very characteristics that have made corn flakes grow in popularity each year as a breakfast, luncheon or supper cereal—lend themselves time and again to many recipes that need just these qualities to give them character and palate appeal. So corn flakes have become a favorite ingredient for puddings, cookies and candies. Corn flake crumbs, because they are easy to roll and need no sifting, are replacing bread crumbs for crumbing fish, croquettes and sweet potato balls. And these same crumbs mixed with melted butter and a sprinkling of sugar make an interesting topping for desserts, or pressed into a pie plate form a fitting background for the most tempting pie filling.

Have you ever tried corn flake crumbs as base and topping for refrigerator cheese cake? It's so simple to prepare and the cake cuts as if by magic without a quiver or a crumbling of the crust. The corn flake crumbs, still pleasantly crunchy, add just the desired contrast to the fine spongy texture of the cheese mixture.

**Refrigerator Cheese Cake**  
2 tablespoons gelatin  
½ cup cold water  
2 egg yolks, slightly beaten  
1 teaspoon salt  
½ cup milk  
½ cup sugar  
1 pound cottage cheese (put through sieve)  
1 lemon, grated rind and juice.  
1 teaspoon vanilla extract  
2 egg whites, stiffly beaten  
1 cup whipping cream  
Soften gelatin in cold water. Put egg yolks in top of double boiler. Beat slightly and add salt, milk and sugar. Cook, stirring until mixture thickens. Remove from fire. Add softened gelatine; mix thoroughly; cool. Add cheese which has been put through a sieve, lemon juice, rind and vanilla. Fold in beaten egg whites and whipped cream.  
Press two-thirds of the corn flake pastry into the bottom of large spring form mold. Pour in cheese mixture. Sprinkle remaining corn flake pastry crumbs over the top. Chill until firm.

**Corn Flake Pastry**  
1 cup corn flakes  
1 ½ cup melted butter  
¼ cup sugar  
½ teaspoon cinnamon  
Roll or grind four cups corn flakes to yield one cup fine crumbs. Mix crumbs with butter, sugar and cinnamon. Use as directed above.

**Apple Pan Dowdy**  
Pastry  
1 quart tart apples, sliced  
¾ cup sugar  
1 teaspoon cinnamon  
½ teaspoon nutmeg  
½ teaspoon salt  
2 tablespoons butter  
1 cup molasses  
2 tablespoons water  
Line baking dish with pastry. Fill with apples, mixed with sugar, spices and salt. Add two-thirds of the molasses, the butter and water. Cover with pastry and bake in a moderate oven, 350 degrees F. for one hour. Remove from oven and cut pastry with a knife and fork and mix thoroughly with the apples. Add remaining molasses, return to slow oven, 325 degrees F. and cook another hour.

**New England Pudding**  
4 cups milk  
½ cup Indian meal  
2-3 cup molasses  
½ teaspoon salt  
2 cups cold milk  
Scald milk, add Indian meal slowly stirring constantly until thick, then add molasses and salt. Remove from fire, put in buttered baking dish, add two cups cold milk. Bake in moderate oven, 325 degrees F. for three hours. Serve warm with hard sauce, plain cream or vanilla ice cream.

Variations—½ teaspoon cinnamon and ginger may be added if a spicy pudding is desired. One cup of figs cut in tiny strips may be added before baking.

**Topioca Indian Pudding**  
1 quart milk  
1 egg  
1 tablespoon butter  
½ teaspoon salt  
½ teaspoon cinnamon  
½ cup molasses  
½ cup sugar  
3 tablespoons pearl tapioca  
1 tablespoon Indian meal  
Soak tapioca in cold water until soft. Scald milk, stir in Indian meal wet with cold water to make a thin paste. Cook 5 minutes, then add tapioca, butter, well beaten egg, salt sugar and molasses. Pour into buttered dish. Bake slowly, 325 degrees F., two hours.

**Brown Rim Cookies**  
1 cup shortening  
1 teaspoon salt  
2 teaspoons grated orange rind or 1 teaspoon vanilla  
2-3 cup sugar  
2 eggs, well beaten  
2 ½ cups sifted flour  
Combine shortening, salt, and orange rind or vanilla. Add sugar, then beaten eggs and beat thoroughly. Add flour and mix well. Drop from tip of teaspoon on greased baking sheets, (or press through pastry bag). Let stand a few minutes, then flatten cookies by stamping with a glass covered with a damp cloth. Bake in moderately hot oven, 375 degrees F. 8 to ten minutes, or until delicately browned. Makes 4 ½ dozen.

## LOVELINESS FOR YOUTH, SOPHISTICATION FOR AGE

If you have dandruff brushing and oil treatments may help; a special dandruff ointment or tonic may help. If your scalp is healthy and your hair shiny you can chalk up one point in favor of your final good looks mark.

A clear skin is next on our list—though it is the young girl's greatest asset and should lead all others. force decided the British authorities that if they wished to retain their possession of Acadia they must take drastic action so the city of Halifax was founded two years later. During all this time the Acadians found themselves between contending forces, the English on the one hand who wished to strengthen their position and the French who endeavored to harass the English in the settlement of Acadia through the Acadians. Things went from bad to worse culminating in the sending of a force of New England troops from Boston in 1755 which captured Fort Beauséjour on the French side of the disputed western boundary line of Acadia which was formed in part by the Missiquash River and lay between what is now Sackville, in New Brunswick, and Amherst, in Nova Scotia, and the tragic exile of the Acadians quickly followed. The Acadians at Minudie were gathered in along with their compatriots had departed and the settlement came to an end, later to be renewed when some of the exiles returned.

About this time, there lived in Boston a poet and dreamer but who coupled with his poetry and dreaming shrewdness in business affairs. His name was Amos Seaman. In the vicinity of Minudie are ledges from which he quarried grindstones and from his trading between Boston and the West Indies he had acquired a fortune. Seaman occupied a mansion in Boston, known as "the Boston House," but his heart was in Minudie which he had acquired by purchase from the military officer to whom it had been granted. He had a monopoly of the stone trade of America and had established a large store in Minudie. He became known as King Seaman and here it was that he attempted to build his dream state. He built a house and it to him was "home." He spent lavishly of the wealth he had acquired in his trading ventures to make living ideal among the villagers of his beloved Minudie. With his passing in 1866 the village began to fall on evil days, its prosperity endured only so long as its benefactor lived. Since then the village has dwindled till now all that is left to recall the dreamer and his dream is "The Homestead" that he built and the recollections of some of the older generation who are also passing.

This was not the sole Utopia of the New World. There was the "New Jerusalem" founded by an Alexander McNutt back in 1764 on an island at the entrance to Shelburne harbor, on the south shore of Nova Scotia, and which is still known as McNutt's Island. Here too the ideal life was to be lived but the scheme failed and his followers, like the children of the captivity, sat down by the waters of Shelburne and wept for a lost cause.

And then one is reminded of that early settlement of the Pilgrims at Plymouth. It also started out as an ideal state but fell away from its first conceptions. Over two hundred of the descendants of these Pilgrims sailed away in 1759 to Liverpool, also on the south shore of Nova Scotia, to start life anew and many of their descendants are still to be found there and in adjacent towns and villages.

### GARDEN PLOT FOR PRINCESS ELIZABETH

If price of land were taken into consideration, Princess Elizabeth, the heir to England's throne, could aspire to be amateur gardener No. 1 in these isles; for she is to have a liberal slice of parkland at the back of Buckingham Palace—a property valued at more than \$15,000,000—where she can grow bulbs and other blooms.
