Jeanette MacDonald Re-  
turns to Programme;  
Will Also Feature St.  
Luke's Boy Choir

Christmas rings in a musical prelude Sunday on Vicks' Open House, Dec. 19, at 8 p.m. AST, over the Columbia Broadcasting System, with Jeanette MacDonald and the St. Luke's Boy Chorists, presenting an all-Christmas programme.

The boy singers, who made their first appearance with Miss MacDonald in the picture, "San Francisco" last year, joined her at Open House once before this season when music of the picture was radio previewed.

The program will open with Miss MacDonald singing "Parade of the Wooden Soldiers" by Leon Jessel, introduced in "La Chaux Souris," and "Toyland" from "Babes in Toyland" by Victor Herbert. The Open House chorus will sing the popular song, "Throw Another Log on the Fire" with an interpolation by Miss MacDonald singing "Love's Old Song" by J. L. Molloy. Josef Pasternack will direct the orchestra in "March of Toys" from the Herbert operetta, "Babes in Toyland."

"The Waltz Song" from "Romeo and Juliet" by Gounod has been chosen by Miss MacDonald for her operetta selection. Wilbur Evans, who will fly in for the Sunday broadcast from a concert appearance in the Middle West, will sing "I've Told Every Little Star" from Jerome Kern's "Music in the Air."

CORPORATION ANNOUNCES FOURTEEN  
HOUR PROGRAM SCHEDULE XMAS DAY

## OFFICIAL OPENING CBL

Many Important Broadcasts Including Metropolitan Opera and Special "Canadian Christmas" to be Presented; Network To Open at 10:50 A. M., Atlantic Standard Time

OTTAWA, Dec. 18.—The official opening of CBL, 50,000 watt Ontario regional transmitter at Hornby, Ont. and the message to the Empire by His Majesty the King, who will speak from Sandringham House, (England), will mark the beginning of a 14-hour schedule of special broadcasts to be presented over the national network of the CBC on Christmas Day, it has been announced here. The Corporation's network which will be in operation from 10:50 a.m. until 1:00 a.m., will carry fifteen major programs, four of which will originate in England, Italy and the United States, the others in various parts of Canada.

King George who will follow the custom of his beloved father in speaking to his subjects throughout the world on Christmas Day, will be heard at 10 a.m. His message will be picked up by both the trans-Atlantic Marconi Beam System and the CBC short-wave receiving station near Ottawa.

## OPENING OF CBL

At 9:50 a.m. Hon. C. D. Howe, Minister of Transport, will officially dedicate CBL to the network. This new high-powered station, identical to CFB, Vercheres, P.Q., which was inaugurated Dec. 11 will be the latest fulfillment of Corporation plans to provide Canada with more satisfactory broadcast coverage and reception. His Majesty's address will follow immediately. Listeners then will hear a special program by the Toronto Symphony Orchestra conducted by Sir Ernest MacMillan and the Mendelssohn Choir conducted by Dr. H. A. Fricke.

Other important broadcasts to be heard throughout the day will include an Anglican service from St. James Cathedral, Toronto, during which the Most Reverend Derwyn T. Owen, Archbishop of Toronto and Primate of all Canada will deliver a Christmas message. The Very Reverend C. E. Kelly, Dean of Toronto, will conduct the service. The broadcast will be heard from 12 a.m. to 1 p.m. From 1 to 2 p.m. "The Christmas Stocking," a children's fantasy, will be presented from Vancouver.

## Will Join NBC

At 2 p.m. the Corporation will join NBC in bringing to listeners a special Christmas Day program from the Vatican. This will feature music by the Sistine Chapel Choir, Beniamino Gigli, tenor soloist, and the Pontifical Orchestra under the direction of Monsignor Lorenzo Perosi. At 3:00 p.m. "Romeo and Juliet" with Richard Crooks, tenor, and Bidu Sayon, soprano will be broadcast from the stage of the Metropolitan Opera House in New York.

## Panorama of Canadian Scenes

CBC's own special broadcast will be presented at 6 p.m. This will be "Canadian Christmas" a panorama of Canadian scenes showing how citizens throughout the Dominion are celebrating the day. "Canadian Christmas" will be produced by Laurence Gilliam, BBC producer, who is on six months' loan to the CBC.

Dan McCowan, noted Banff naturalist, will be heard from Toronto at 7:30 p.m. in a broadcast talk entitled "The Animals' Christmas," and at 7:45 there will be presented a recital by Roberto Wood, baritone, from Winnipeg. At 8 p.m. the Corporation's Montreal studios will feature "From the Lyric Stage," a broadcast produced by Rooney Pelletier, with orchestra, soloists and mixed chorus, directed by Giuseppe Agostini. This will be followed at 8:45 by a talk by Douglas MacKay, author and lecturer, entitled "Moccasins and Furs"—Christmas in the Fur.

Play by Lady Tweedsmuir  
At 9 p.m. "Reindeer Christmas," a play written by Her Excellency, the Lady Tweedsmuir, and adapted for radio by Rupert Lucas, will be produced from Toronto. "Yuletide Music," an orchestral program directed by Percy Harvey will be broadcast from Vancouver at 9:30 p.m.

Hockey Broadcast  
Hockey fans throughout Canada will hear the NHL broadcast from

NATIONAL AUDITIONS TO SELECT  
CHILD WINNERS OF FOUR TONY WONS  
VIOLINS, ALSO SCHOLARSHIPS BEGIN

Bursary of \$250 Goes With Rare Violins; National Federation Of Music Club Sponsors Coast-to-Coast Auditions in Twenty Cities; Finals Held In New York Over Columbia Network

Four talented child violinists, under 16 years of age, will be selected to receive one of the rare handmade violins constructed by Tony Wons, radio philosopher, in a nationwide series of auditions sponsored and conducted by the National Federation of Music Clubs. It was announced today by Mrs. Vincent Hillier Ober, president of the Federation. In addition, each of the four young winners

will receive a \$250 Vicks Scholarship from Tony's sponsors, and a trip to New York City where they will be presented on a special network program over the Columbia Broadcasting System, sometime early in March. Applications for auditions will be received during the period from December 20 to January 15 and the auditions in the twenty key cities will be concluded in time to send recordings of the local winners into New York where a national board of distinguished judges will listen to these radio recordings and select the four winners, by February 25th. Each of the local city winners will receive a certificate of merit and the recording of their own audition selection, and the four finalists will receive the violins and the cash scholarships.

The Tony Wons violins, beautifully made of rare woods and with superb tones, represent nearly eight years of painstaking work by the noted radio commentator. They have been pre-

pared by Mrs. Ruth Haller Ottaway, former president of the National Federation of Music Clubs, has been designated by Mrs. Ober to handle contest details and arrangements for the reception of the winners in New York City.

The twenty key cities in which the sectional and semi-final auditions will be conducted, each with its local board of noted judges, include: Boston, New York, Philadelphia, Washington, Greensboro, N.C., Atlanta, New Orleans, Dallas, San Francisco, Portland, Ore., Seattle, Salt Lake City, Denver, Wichita, Kans., Minneapolis, Chicago, Memphis, Cincinnati, Detroit and Charleston W. Va.

Applications, in writing, should be addressed to the "National Federation of Music Clubs-Tony Wons Violin Auditions Committee," and mailed to either the Columbia Broadcasting station in any of the cities listed, to any local music club which is a member of the National Federation, or to the national contest headquarters, Room 1800, 122 East 42nd Street, New York City.
